RURAL SPEED MANAGEMENT

Since the public question time discussion at the Parish Council meeting on 3 September with representatives from SBC, we have had further consultation with some interested parties, notably local farmers, as a result of which SBC has made some adjustments to the proposed western gateway to Bishopstone. Plans for the following were approved at the Parish Council meeting on 1 October:

- Traffic calming at both ends of Bishopstone, involving improved signage, gateways and one way traffic.
- Signing of Cues Lane to reduce unnecessary access by large vehicles.
- White lines and hatching around the houses close to Hinton Parva village hall, where the road is very narrow.
- Improved white lining and signage between Hinton Parva and Hinton Springs.
- Improved signage on Bodyhorse Hill

We understand that work will start in November.

Crime Performance Comment

Firstly, the negatives.

It is disappointing to note that domestic burglaries have shown an increase over the previous 12 months. This is at odds with the "Force" performance and other parts of Swindon. However, I can assure everyone that domestic burglaries are a local priority and considerable work is being undertaken to address the issue. Furthermore, there have been notable recent successes by our Priority Crime Team in catching burglars who have been operating across Swindon and North Wiltshire. Therefore, I fully expect these arrests to have a positive impact going forward.

Vehicle crime has shown an increase in the Urban sector, so please remove all valuables from your vehicle when it is not attended.

If you see any suspicious activity, report it to police as soon as possible.

Don't forget that prevention is better (and usually cheaper) than cure!

In the Rural sector, there is a small increase in Violence against the Person, which is principally made up of assaults but does include other matters. However, this is a very small increase and is better than the picture in the rest of Swindon. Please do not run away with the idea that Swindon and Wiltshire have become a lawless and dangerous place. Last year was exceptional and when compared with 2 and 3 years ago we are showing a small decrease.

Now, the positives.

Across the locality, there have been 145 fewer victim of crime – a reduction of 12%.

Anti-social behaviour (ASB). We continue to work closely with our colleagues within the Anti-Social Behaviour Unit of SBC, which is the lead unit for tackling ASB.

ASB at a locality level is showing a very positive year-on-year reduction of 11%. However, there is a clear Rural/Urban split with the "town showing a 15% rise but the "villages" a huge fall of 43%. The Community Beat Manager, Rory Draper, is working hard with his team to maintain the Rural performance. Whilst we all want to see a reduction in ASB, I am not naïve enough to believe that these figures represent every incident. Therefore, I would encourage residents to make reports to either SBC ASBU or ourselves. Don't suffer in silence; our message to you is: "We can't deal with it if we don't know about it".

Therefore my overall assessment is very positive and please be assured that we are doing everything we can to improve your safety and quality of life.

Council Tax Benefits

We have been advised that Swindon Borough Council [SBC] is opening a consultation period on a Council Tax Support scheme, which will replace the current Council Tax Benefits system; the consultation is open until 9 November 2012. The following gives an outline:

From April 2013, Council Tax Benefit in its current form is being withdrawn by the Government, as part of its wide-ranging reforms to the welfare system. Council Tax Benefit currently helps those on low incomes to pay their Council Tax bill. Local Authorities are being asked to develop their own local schemes instead, which will be known as Council Tax Support; the local schemes will sit alongside a new national system of Universal Credits, which will replace all other forms of financial support to those on low or no income.

Currently, the £13 million of Council Tax Benefit awarded by SBC is reimbursed in full by Central Government. From next year, the amount paid to the Council, (including Fire and Police Authorities) for services delivered in Swindon will be reduced to approximately £11 million. This is part of the Government's drive to encourage people to work by removing disincentives, and means that SBC will need to identify ways of meeting the £2m shortfall in Government funding in 2013/2014.

The Government has stated that local schemes should be designed to meet the needs of local people and the impact on the most vulnerable must be considered. The SBC consultation paper states that everybody who receives Council Tax Benefit, except pensioners and households including a disabled person, will be affected by the changes because they will have to pay something towards their Council Tax.

A number of ways in which this shortfall may be addressed are being considered by SBC; they are outlined in the consultation papers, with impact statements.

It is emphasised that the Parish Council is not responsible for any of the above proposals, either by Central Government or SBC. The purpose of this notice is to alert parishioners to look further into the proposals if they wish to.

SMALL PRINT

Welcome

The Parish Council always extends a warm welcome to all new and prospective residents of the Parish. We are very pleased that you've chosen to live in our community.

The Parish contains two conservation areas and everything south of the Icknield Way is also in the North Wessex Downs Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. Many houses are also listed.

Naturally this brings with it all sorts of problems when it comes to tree felling, house alterations, etc. There are also other regulations aimed at preserving the character

and beauty of the parish. If in doubt, please check, we are only a phone call away.

The Parish Council is therefore always available to answer any questions you may have on any particular aspect of living in a conservation area, the area of outstanding natural beauty or in listed buildings. Please do not hesitate to contact either the Clerk, the Chair or any member of the council - the numbers appear on the next page.

We do hope you will be very happy here.

Parish Documents

The Parish has an archive room in the village hall in Bishopstone. This is not accessible to members of the public, however, with advanced warning any document stored there may be viewed by contacting a member of the council.

Documents of particular importance are also stored on

the parish website and may be viewed by anyone with a PC. Members of the parish without a PC can ask the clerk to provide them with a hard copy.

Documents on the website include the precept, the accounts, standing orders, annual Returns, etc.

Parish Parking

The Parish has many narrow lanes and these need to be accessible to residents, utility and emergency vehicles at all times. Cars are now being parked along some of the narrowest sections of road (e.g. Cues Lane in Bishopstone, High Street, Bishopstone, etc.) often blocking these routes to even small vehicles. Please remember that emergency vehicles need to be able to move freely down all the roads and lanes of the parish at all times. Could we therefore ask that owners of vehicles park them responsibly and avoid the narrowest sections.

THE Village Hall car park in Bishopstone is a private space available only for those using the village hall. It is not somewhere for parishioners to park on a long term basis; whatever the circumstances might be. This is

clearly signed on the wall of the hall. Cars parked here make it very difficult for legitimate car park users to find space for their vehicles. It is also incredibly inconvenient for those users having to load and unload items, or for the infirm or disabled who wish to make use of the hall. Provided the hall is not in use, loading and unloading of vehicles is permitted, as is visitor parking for short periods. By prior arrangement with the committee the siting of skips can also be accommodated. The committee very much regret that it cannot offer parking for those in need, however, hall users must come first and from the complaints received these are frequently finding it difficult to park.

Protected Trees

Trees are vital to the quality of our lives for a number of reasons:-

- They help make our two villages more pleasant and attractive places in which to live and work.
- They are often a familiar and cherished feature and so provide a sense of place.
- They provide a valuable habitat for wildlife.

They are often older than many of the buildings amongst which they stand and so contribute to our local history. Because they are so important to our environment all trees within a Conservation Area are protected by law*. The **whole** of Bishopstone is within a Conservation Area. The **whole** of Hinton Parva centred around the church is also within a Conservation Area. Anyone planning to cut down or carry out work to a tree here must give the Borough Council six weeks written notice of their intention to do so.

*Whilst there are one or two exemptions, such as trees with a diameter of less than 3 inches (measured 1.5m from the ground) or when a tree is in a dangerous condition, you are strongly advised to check first with the Council's Tree Officer since any unauthorised works can be a criminal offence which could lead to prosecution and heavy fines of up to £20,000. Better to be safe than sorry!

Individual trees or groups of trees that make a particularly important contribution to either of our villages may be worthy of special protection by way of a Tree Preservation Order. If you know of any such trees then please do not hesitate to contact any Member of the Parish Council or the Borough Council's Tree Officer who will be happy to make an inspection.

Outside Lights

One of the things that makes the Parish so unique and wonderful is the lack of street lighting to blight the villages. Sadly more and more people are now erecting high wattage outside lights and leaving them on permanently. Please consider your neighbours who may not wish their rooms lit throughout the night especially bedrooms where sleep can be seriously disturbed.

Emma Marrington, CPRE's Rural Policy Campaigner said:

'Many lives are affected by light pollution. It can disturb sleep, disfigure the countryside and make the stars at night invisible to huge numbers of people.'

Discrete and considerate outside lighting that only comes on when needed is the best type to mount if lighting is considered necessary.

Everyone is becoming more aware how energy wastage is resulting in the earth's resources being diminished. Every light that is on when no one needs to use the light it casts is adding to this wastage.

So please look at your lighting needs and think of your neighbours as well as the planet and only light when needed.
