## REMOVAL OF BT PHONE BOX, HINTON PARVA

Once again, BT wants to remove the red phone box in Hinton Parva because of lack of use. Swindon Borough Council has asked the Parish Council to consult residents about their views. The Parish Council feels strongly that it should be retained in case of emergencies in The Coombes, at the village hall or at the dangerous Body Horse Hill junction, particularly as the mobile phone service is so unreliable in this part of the village.

It is an effort worth making. Last time, your swift action helped us retain both threatened phone boxes. The one in Bishopstone is now safe as it has been Grade 2 listed by Historic England. Sadly, listing is not an option for the kiosk in Hinton Parva, as it is not in the conservation area or near a listed building. Emergency need and poor mobile coverage are the only two Ofcom criteria that could justify retention of this phone box.

Please write in quickly, SBC needs a reponse by 13th December so they can present a case to BT.

## INTERNET SERVICE COMPLAINTS

Parish Councillors know that many villagers have been experiencing problems with internet speeds and connectivity. However, it seems that service providers don't know the extent of the problem as very few complaints have reached them. Getting action to improve internet services in the villages will be easier if accurate data is available. Councillors therefore urge you to report problems to your reseller so complaints can be logged to support the need for action.

## ODDS and ENDS

### IMPORTANT ADVICE

Swindon Borough Council often notify us of important consultations and drop in events with timescales that make it not worth inserting in the Parish Times as the deadlines will have passed before it is read. It is therefore important to keep an eye on the village noticeboards and website for up-to-date news.

### DOG EXCREMENT

It has been reported to Councillors that there is a lot of dog excrement being left on the roads and paths in the Parish and also hung in bags from the trees.

The Parish Council has funded several dog bins which are situated in various locations throughout the Parish and are emptied by our Lenghman regularly.

**PLEASE USE THE DOG BINS AND DO NOT LEAVE BAGS WITH EXCREMENT HANGING FROM TREES AROUND THE VILLAGES.**

### OUTSIDE LIGHTS

One of the things that makes the Parish so unique and wonderful is the lack of street lighting to blight the villages. Sadly more and more people are now erecting high wattage outside lights and leaving them on permanently. Please consider your neighbours who may not wish their rooms lit throughout the night especially bedrooms where sleep can be seriously disturbed.

Emma Marrington, CPRE's Rural Policy Campaigner said:

*"Many lives are affected by light pollution. It can disturb sleep, disfigure the countryside and make the stars at night invisible to huge numbers of people."*

Discrete and considerate outside lighting that only comes on when needed is the best type to mount if lighting is considered necessary. Everyone is becoming more aware how energy wastage is resulting in the earth's resources being diminished. Every light that is on when no one needs to use the light it casts is adding to this wastage. So please look at your lighting needs and think of your neighbours as well as the planet and only light when needed.

### PARISH BUSINESS

The Parish Council's monthly meeting is a very effective and immediate forum for discussion of matters of concern to villagers. Every Parish Council meeting starts with a 'public question time' and all residents are welcome to attend and ask questions. Dates for the year ahead are shown below. Meetings usually start at 7.30pm, alternating between Bishopstone and Hinton Parva. Residents can also contact the Clerk to raise any issue, and councillors will respond as quickly and fully as possible.

## Council has preparations in place ahead of winter season

A team of eight drivers and eight gritting lorries are on standby should Swindon be hit by freezing temperatures over the coming months.

More than 500 tonnes of salt were delivered to Swindon Borough Council's Waterside depot in Cheney Manor Industrial Estate during the summer, taking the road salt stockpile to over 1,300 tonnes.

The salt which has been put aside by the Council is enough to treat the town's priority routes more than 50 times. Additional salt is on provisional order should Swindon experience snow or prolonged cold spells with further salt stocks easily available should they be needed.

Last year, the Council treated the priority routes 28 times using approximately 950 tonnes of salt.

The Council's gritting team will be on alert 24 hours a day to grit the priority routes, which cover 208 miles of the borough's 520-mile road network. They will also be on hand to plough the routes in the event of heavy snowfall.

The Council's drivers have been out training over the past few weeks going over their routes and making sure they are as prepared as possible in the event of severe weather.

The Council has emergency planning procedures in place and staff in many service areas will also be placed on standby in the event of severe weather.

Councillor Maureen Penny, Swindon Borough Council's Cabinet Member for Transport and the Environment, said: "Our gritting team have only just finished their winter training so are as prepared as they can be for any cold weather that might come our way in the months ahead.

"Last year, they did a tremendous job keeping our priority routes clear and we will need them again this winter should the weather take a turn for the worse.

"We have ordered plenty of road salt and have contingencies in place to order more should we need it, although our team's good planning means we always have plenty in reserve. We also have plans in place to ensure we have staff ready to respond around the clock and keep our vulnerable residents safe in adverse weather."

### Obscured Road Signs, your help is requested

Keeping our village roads safe is a priority for all of us. Ensuring road signs are visible and clear of vegetation is an important contribution to this effort. If you have a road sign on your property or even one near you, please could you ensure that it is clearly visible and not obscured by vegetation. THANK YOU for your efforts.

### Reporting Problems to Swindon Borough Council

For the last several years the Parish Council has advocated the use of a third party website [www.fixmystreet.com](http://www.fixmystreet.com) to report and track issues such as fly-tipping or pot-holes to SBC. There is now a service on SBC's website at [www.swindon.gov.uk/my\\_account](http://www.swindon.gov.uk/my_account) where residents can report these issues directly. Recent experience has shown there is a faster response to those issues reported directly.

### Parish Documents

The Parish has an archive room in the village hall in Bishopstone. This is not accessible to members of the public, however, with advanced warning any document stored there may be viewed by contacting a member of the council. Documents of particular importance are also stored on the parish website and may be viewed by anyone with a PC. Members of the parish without a PC can ask the clerk to provide them with a hard copy.

Documents on the website include the precept, the accounts, standing orders, annual Returns, etc.

### Parish Parking

The Parish has many narrow lanes and these need to be accessible to residents, utility and emergency vehicles at all times. Cars are now being parked along some of the narrowest sections of road (e.g. Cues Lane in Bishopstone, High Street, Bishopstone, etc.) often blocking these routes to even small vehicles. Please remember that emergency vehicles need to be able to move freely down all the roads and lanes of the parish at all times. Could we therefore ask that owners of vehicles park them responsibly and avoid the narrowest sections.

The Village Hall car park in Bishopstone is a private space available only for those using the village hall. It is not somewhere for parishioners to park on a long term basis; whatever the circumstances might be. This is clearly signed on the wall of the hall.

Cars parked here make it very difficult for legitimate car park users to find space for their vehicles. It is also incredibly inconvenient for those users having to load and unload items, or for the infirm or disabled who wish to make use of the hall. Provided the hall is not in use, loading and unloading of vehicles is permitted, as is visitor parking for short periods. By prior arrangement with the committee the siting of skips can also be accommodated.

The committee very much regret that it cannot offer parking for those in need, however, hall users must come first and from the complaints received these are frequently finding it difficult to park.

The Village Hall Management Committee asks that residents remember that *'Skips should not be positioned in close proximity to the Hall structure'*.

### Trees in conservation areas

The whole of Bishopstone and most of Hinton Parva lies within a Conservation Area and as such the legislation is similar to that relating to a Tree Preservation Order, including the financial penalties and tree replacement. If you want to carry out works to a tree you will need to submit a 'notice of intent' to Swindon Borough Council. If you have not heard back from them by the time the six weeks has expired then you may proceed with the works described in your letter. You can complete the Swindon Borough Council Notification for Works on Protected Trees in a Conservation Area form online: [https://www.swindon.gov.uk/forms/form/252/en/applicationnotification\\_for\\_works\\_on\\_protected\\_trees](https://www.swindon.gov.uk/forms/form/252/en/applicationnotification_for_works_on_protected_trees)

You are not required to submit a notice for the cutting down, topping or lopping or uprooting of a tree whose diameter does not exceed 75 millimetres; or the cutting down or uprooting of a tree, whose diameter does not exceed 100 millimetres, for the sole purpose of improving the growth of other trees (eg thinning as part of forestry operations). In either case, the diameter of the tree is to be measured over the bark of the tree at 1.5 metres above ground level. These exemptions do not apply in circumstances where a tree has more than one stem at a point 1.5 metres above the natural ground level if any stem when measured over its bark at that point exceeds the relevant minimum.

And remember—anyone who cuts down, uproots, tops, lops, wilfully destroys or wilfully damages a tree in a conservation area or causes or permits such work, without giving notice is guilty of an offence, unless one of the exceptions above applies.

## PLANNING

### Pre-Application Advice

The Parish Council encourages prospective applicants for planning permission to seek pre-application advice from Swindon Borough Council. Not only does this assist the Parish Council when commenting on applications but going through this process has many benefits for the applicant:-

- It can help applicants understand how relevant planning policies and guidance will be applied to their proposal.
- It can improve the quality of planning application submissions by identifying areas that need to be addressed at an early stage you where you might need specialist advice, such as ecology or high-ways, before you submit.
- It can help applications be registered more speedily and can improve the likelihood of a successful outcome.
- It can save you time and money by identifying if a proposal is unacceptable in principle at an early stage.
