Nothing in today's modern world is more certain than change, and the ability and willingness to respond to the demands of change will define those who survive. However, in this context it is quite unusual after a century to see two of our local farms facing a new direction. The Ball's have farmed in Idstone for 100 years and, following Bill's death last November, the farm is likely to be sold this summer. Also in Bishopstone, Robbie Selbourne has decided to retire from Prebendal Farm this coming Michaelmas. The Selbournes and, before, Robbie's grandparents' family, the Wilsons, have been tenants of the Church Commissioners there for 120 years. With vacant possession, it will be interesting to see whether the church eventually sells or leases again. Robbie tells me he and Jo would like to like to find a new home with *chalk under their feet*.

After this winter I can well understand this sentiment. Living here on the slope of the downs we are ever grateful to have avoided the agony of those affected elsewhere by floods near rivers. The continuous deluges have filled up the deep chalk aquifers, which is a good thing, but just now water and springs are gushing out everywhere like a leaking colander. With a few exceptions, walking in this downland landscape can still be a pleasure for humankind and their dogs, avoiding the worst of the mud. The Ridgeway and the Ashdown estate give lots of options. Getting there can be the problem. If it's good for the heart to take strong exercise, the tarmac of the hills above Compton, Ashbury and Idstone present good stiff challenges. We find Nell Hill to the downs above Bishopstone less steep. The Ashbury coombes, the two footpaths behind St Mary's church, Ashbury, the Bishopstone valleys and lynchets, and the National Trust valley above Hinton all offer wonderful

walking in a special landscape.

Come 1st April, because I am an optimist, it just could be drying up which hopefully might not be an April fool. We will then probably be approaching the peak of the coronavirus problem and we may be subject to some forms of isolation where a blast in open air could be therapeutic and surely permitted. If as farmers we are able to get on the land I did once receive advice that the test to know when it was sufficiently dry was to drop one's drawers/strides /knickers, sit down on the soil, feel the warmth, experience a lack of soil particles sticking, and then it was ok to get going! This column hopes we can all stay fit and healthy and there will be someone left to drive the tractors and feed the animals.

School Report



As always at school we have been busy with lots of thought provoking trips, visits and speakers. The careers week was a huge success, certainly to be repeated.

KS2 were left full of knowledge after a talk about how the Dakota planes were based nearby at Membury in WW2, which tied in nicely with their topic, *being evacuated*. Bishopstone school had 20 evacuees at one point, they were never named however, and just called *the evacuee children* in the school log books. Two of them unhappily clearly, as they ran away after attending for just one day. They all came from the Holloway area of London.

We were delighted to welcome *the-staysafeinitiative* into school for a day, educating the children and working around our lessons planned alongside *Safer Internet Day*. They worked through a range of practical workshops with lots of information on how to stay SMART online, critical in this age. The school also joined a new support system for parents linked to the internet, providing parents at home with a wealth of information.

Year 5/6 children visited Pinewood to make use of their science lab, learning to complete Bunsen burner flame tests, chromatography and creating microscope slides. It was great to see the children so hands on and able to use the correct apparatus with care and appreciation.

Bishopstone School Bake Off saw children and parents creating delicious cakes You have truly never seen so much cake! It was a fantastic event that saw the final being judged by the school governors. For pictures of their amazing entries, please look at the school website. The school website is currently having a small *makeover* and in eight weeks' time should be far more user-friendly and easier to navigate. . .it is almost as old as my time at Bishopstone!

We have had our normal cinema night, curling up with two films and then Grandparents joined us for an afternoon of sharing. We had to guess the cost of a house and car in 1912 (could you...?), complete some origami, alongside other-hands on activities, finishing with that old favourite for young and old.....bingo!!

Nothing like, *two little ducks*. KS1 completed the afternoon with a beautiful assembly which focused on our environment, and all the work that they had been learning about the Arctic. World Book Day rolled around again; this year, the children created potato book characters . . they were super, (and included lots of *Super-tato*), and we had great fun guessing which was which, again, pictures on the website. *Dress up* saw characters from Harry Potter and Little Red Riding Hood, through to Charlie and the Chocolate Factory! The love of reading is key to childhood and we are continuing with various activities to fuel this passion . . . next up is Teddy Sleepover . . . I wonder what they will get up to when left alone?! KS2 created a dramatic dance which they performed at Swindon Dance Festival. The daunting prospect of being on stage is wearing off now. They were colourful and dynamic and did the school proud! Lots more coming up, and, with the daffodils out in full, we really are now turning that corner into Spring.

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

Dear Friends and Neighbours

We have a long history of people that have prayed for us through all sorts of difficulties over the centuries, and as I have said before, I never ever met an atheist on a sinking ship! So whether we are busy at work, or sitting at home, twenty minutes of prayer for others will help them, and often has the impact of providing us with a bit of peace in the midst of the madness in which we find ourselves.

Wanborough Community Trust

Wanborough Community Fund started out several years ago when a small group of people took on the reins of running the May Day Fayre, Scarecrow Trail and Quiz nights. The idea of this new organisation was to run local community fundraising events to raise funds for local projects / activities / groups. The Fund covers Wanborough, Liddington, Hinton Parva & Bishopstone, as many of the supporters for our fundraising events come from all areas of the Benefice. Through a grant application and allocation process Wanborough Community Fund will support local groups / activities as funds are available. The organisation is now registered with the Charity Commission as Wanborough Community Trust and is able to allocate funds through an application process.

With funds in our account now we are keen to start the application and allocation process so groups/projects/events can benefit from the fundraising many of our villagers have been supporting for the last few years.

The types of projects that have already shown an interest whilst we've been waiting to secure Charity status are: Lyddington Bells replacement project; Wanborough local history storyboards project; scout group coach transport to

International Jamboree; annual event for senior members of the community; bi-annual event for junior members of our community. There will be many more... perhaps a feasibility study for the setting up of a community shop/café; other local groups needing funds for equipment / clothing etc.

Once registered, applicants will make a presentation to the Trustees to secure some, or all, of their requested funds for their particular application. Conditions will be attached to completing the projects and spending the funds in a timely way; we will ask for a completion report so we can publicise and promote the projects / activities/events and encourage more members of the community to support our fundraising efforts each year.

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

Members are much more interested in his sheep worrying activities, naturally. However, the general view is that it is unlikely to come to court, unlike that long forgotten sad case over the border in Oxfordshire (which is at least 1.5 miles away) where men are men and sheep are now very nervous.

It will reduce the supply of UK produce, of course, meaning supplies won't be so plentiful, but it'll be OK because by then we'll be importing even more cheap pork and chicken from the rest of the world, while supply lines are available. The current doubts about, and fragility of, supply lines will be ignored in pursuit of better trade deals and cheaper stuff on shelves. And this will work perfectly well until that fragility becomes acute and supply lines break. In the short term, Dickie, let us have our cake! And let us eat it. In very large amounts. People aren't that bothered about five years down the road, it seems to me. Which reminds me, one of our occasional mean-spirited customers brought a cake into the pub the other day and escaped without the cake tax I have previously applied to people who think we are a glorified picnic zone. I am still losing sleep over her. Our frontline wildlife man, James Andrews, has been taking one or two people on night-time farm safaris, and in early March they spotted polecats at the northern end of the farm. Barn owls are now being sighted in three or four different locations. Otters, as you know, have been seen close to the stream where it crosses the lower road. Only once, but that was good

enough. You ought to take James up on his offers of farm safaris—he is a remarkable well of knowledge, about the farm and the wildlife here; and like me, utterly charming. And his wildlife photo hides are worth spending some time in.

Our **Easter Sunday Easter Egg** hunt will meet at the farm offices at 10.30am, tractor and trailer up to the valley, weather permitting. I expect it will still be raining by then. Combined with Brexit and Priti Patel, it's made a depressing start to the year (careful, TF)...£10 per family/car load. All to the tractor driver. Should be finished and back by just after noon. **Classic cars and Drive it Day** are **26th April**, all day; **pig racing 6th June**, and the long awaited and inaugural **Bacon and Literary Festival** will be held in early September, when the heatwave has finished.

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


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
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Exhausted of Hinton Parva
