Dear Editor, We noted Toby's letter in last month's issue about the lack of World War 1 commemorations in the Benefice and would like to put the record straight for Bishopstone. Remembering Bishopstone Lads at the Beginning of World War 1 Robbie Selbourne had been reading his grandmother's War Diaries, and noted that a bell was rung in Bishopstone on the 21st August 1914, the exact date our brave young men left the village to head off to war. Robbie made a point of asking me if the bells could be rung again, 100 years later to the day. A visiting side rang our 'Heavy 8' most beautifully during the afternoon, then there was a minute of chiming on the Sanctus at 7.00pm, and at group practice that evening, local ringers had all eight bells ringing again. The significance of the date was not lost on the ringers nor the people in Bishopstone, and we held the brave young lads in our hearts.

### The Vicar's Letter

Dear Friends,

It's that time of the year when things around us are changing – it's no longer summer and not yet winter. It is an in-between time.

As I look around the garden and greenhouse there is not much bounty left to harvest. The absence of the bright red tomatoes and long deep green cucumbers leave a sense of sadness. The greenhouse is bare at the moment, but it won't be too long before the bench is back in ready for seed trays, the geraniums and dahlias under the bench ready to conserve their energy until after the winter.

The vegetable beds are bare except for the onions and leeks; gone are the long runner beans and their red flowers, the deep purple of the beetroots and the vibrant greens and maroons of varieties of lettuce. And it feels quite sad.

But then I look around at the trees

where leaves have turned all the beautiful colours of autumn, where rich deep glossy conkers are excitedly gathered by children (and some adults too! - when will I grow up?). And suddenly I don't feel sad anymore, but filled with a sense of expectation. All of nature – the trees and the flowers, the birds and animals, and we human beings too – need the rhythm of the seasons, the light and the dark, the sun and the rain, the warmth and the cold to flourish.

So, taking a lesson from nature we could slow down a bit during October and take stock of life and our part within the life at home, in our place of work and in the wider community. Where have we been able to flourish and blossom, able to bring joy and gladness to the life of others around us? What have we learnt from the past few months, how have we grown in our understanding of life and our place within it? Where have we

recognized God at work?

Have we stopped to see him in the wonder and beauty of creation? Have we seen a glimpse of him at work in others? Have we grown in our knowledge and understanding of his awesome wonder and power. Have we shared his love in our relationships with one another? Have we spent time with him in prayer and silence?

I, for one, know that I have not always stopped enough, that I haven't always given God the time that I need to spend with him in order to be refreshed, strengthened and renewed. Let us all take notice of nature and make sure that we make time to stop and just 'be' – so that we may be ready to blossom where God has planted us. Then we will be able to add to the beauty of the creation around us and share God's love with one another.






