

The Royal Oak Diary

As an unlikely future vicar of this patch, this will be my last Royal Oak diary note beginning with the words *I dedicate this month's sermon to.....*, because it will soon start to irritate, or it might become self-fulfilling! Nevertheless, your honour, I do think there needs to be a little dedication towards the movers and shakers of this little patch of England, most of whom go happily unrecognised for the efforts they put in to make life interesting and more amenable for the rest of us in the two villages. Name me another tiny parish anywhere that could host a *Made in Bishopstone* exhibition; an *International Pig Racing Festival*; a stunning *Ceilidh*; a *half marathon*; a successful *village fete* on a wet day; *gardening society*, *great school*, *the farm* on *Panorama*, *the pub* in *The Times*, all in the past 6 weeks; and countless other things that often pass unremarked but enjoyed. The Russells, the Adrians, the Sues, the David and Jackies, the headmistress, the cleaners, the Sid and Cheryls, the Rob and Jos, the Ians and Andys (possibly a new gay couple?), even the Mogs, and the people in Cues Lane who mostly put up with my daft activities, and the people who clean the church for nothing...at this point I will have to lie down in a dark room; I have never before been heard to mutter so many nice words at one hit, without



a bit of anglo-saxon thrown in. That has purged my soul, at last. A little too late. Now, *The Royal Oak*, lauded as *ramshackle* in *The Times* on 13th June; as a *bullshit free zone* in *The Oldie* in June also (I'm quite happy with both descriptions); and full of life as ever as we career towards nine years in charge of this place, employing throughout the food and farming business about 20 people full and part time from our own village. Swindon Borough Council is now in possession of the planning application (you know, multi-storey car park etc); and can I ask that people keep an eye on *The True Heart* in the meantime, since people broke in there three weeks ago. I can assure you there is nothing worth stealing, unless you want scrap metal, some wood for the bonfire and plenty of stuff for the compost heap!

Events wise, we're coming close to the period when life gets a bit quieter as people start to think about their summer holidays; but we've still (as I write this) got about five spaces for the *Test Match Special Summer Supper, 29th June*; Jim Maxwell, forthright Aussie, and Patrick Murphy, opinionated Brit (orig. News from Bishopstone Pottery

Episode 12 A problem with gas!

I am so sorry that we failed to deliver a newsletter last month due to Adrian's hospital stay. Just a bit more treatment and he should be bouncing around again. So thank you to all the people that sent their best wishes, cards, chocolates and offers of help. It was very kind and really helps.

The pottery was pretty busy in the last two weeks of May, frantically finishing off work for the *Made in Bishopstone* event on 31st May. Some great new pots came out of the raku kiln and we were delighted with some of the new designs. As I have said before raku results can be very unpredictable but when they are good they are very, very good!

We also made the long promised *limited edition* pots (picture bottom right) from the clay dug in Bishopstone. We decided to throw a number of smaller pots so that people could buy them as *Bishopstone souvenirs* at Made in Bishopstone. We wanted to glaze some of them with a clear glaze on the inside to waterproof them. However, when we tried this on pots that had been biscuit fired to 1000degrees C, the fired glaze contained lots and lots of tiny air bubbles which spoiled the appearance of the pots. Hmm? We were not sure what was going wrong. After a bit of research we discovered that, amongst other things, some clays can give off gases from decomposing materials in the body of the clay during firing. If the clay is not fired high enough then when the glaze is fired on to the pot the gases continue to be given off and get trapped in the glaze. Hence the small air bubbles. This seemed highly likely, so we experimented and fired the pots to above 1100degrees C. Then we glazed them with the clear glaze, fired them and, lo and behold, we had a shiny glaze with no air bubbles. It always feels good to solve a problem and we had learnt something new. However we still do not know at precisely what temperature the Bishopstone clay stops giving off gases but I am reliably informed that a Thermal Gravimetric Analysis of the clay would give us the answer. I will leave you to look up what that means but I think we will just have fun experimenting with different temperatures and find that out for ourselves – much more enjoyable.

When the Bishopstone clay is fired to just 1000degrees C it has a beautiful orange terracotta colour, but if it is fired to the higher temperature and then glazed the colour darkens to a lovely chocolate brown – just like an overcooked biscuit. We made some of each for *Made in Bishopstone* and we sold almost all of them. I guess we will have to make some more now!
