The Vicar's Letter

Dear Friends and Neighbours,

After only a few weeks Christmas seems a distant memory and here we are days away from the beginning of Lent. With our pancakes at the ready and just like Advent is to Christmas, Lent is also a season of preparation for a great event. Giving things up or doing something positive are regular features of the season of Lent. There is even a book recommended by the Archbishop of Canterbury for reading during this particular season. Like so many training programmes other things are parked or put on hold while concentrating on the training programme itself.

In a similar way, whenever a lifeboat came back from refit we would spend several hours training, so that we could familiarise ourselves with the standard equipment and get trained up on the new. The dear old reliable compass in particular was checked for accuracy, even though we were brimming with satellite navigation and direction finding equipment.

Fumbling around in the dark on a storm tossed boat was so much easier as a result of learning where and how equipment was stored.

So for the Christian, Lent is an opportunity to re-engage with the training programme, as demonstrated in the life and the death of Jesus. It's a time for us to reflect on the value of what He did and indeed the cost. Not from a gloomy sense or perspective, much less to build up a misplaced sense of guilt, but to aid our sense of awe, wonder and indeed inspiration. Repentance is a word often bandied around at this time but again often in a very negative and undermining way. It really means a heartfelt sorrow for when we haven't got things right, together with a commitment to doing things differently and for the better in the future.

Repentance is often confused with the term penance, a kind of payment. The good news of the Gospel is that Jesus has already paid the price for every misdemeanour, on the cross, on Good Friday. All we are asked is to do is to join in with the programme as demonstrated by Him. Again and again,

throughout history people who have done so have felt so much better as a result and amazing events have often accompanied a commitment to following the life and example of Jesus. Many prophecies or predictions in the Jewish Scriptures, the early part of the Bible, were fulfilled by Jesus as were many of His own promises as shown in the later Christian part of the Bible. So there is a huge sense of the reliable about the Bible and the promises it contains. As with so much in life there are lots of opportunities for us to get distracted and some of life's more difficult circumstances can have a huge impact on us too. The reliability of Jesus and His teachings, just like the lifeboat compass, can be counted on and trusted in regardless of the storms that life might throw at us. 
We collected half a van load from the Churches, the volunteers who met us were extremely grateful for our contribution.

As you'll have seen from photographs here and on the front cover, December's unprecedented balmy weather though wet and dismal, has thrown up some surprises with many flowers making an early appearance. Even some bedding plants are still happily thriving but I don't expect my lobelia will be flowering for much longer due to the predicted cold snap ahead. I do hope there are some cold and frosty days to come but a bit of winter sunshine wouldn't go amiss!

We'll hopefully see some new faces when we resume the B&D Garden Club at 7.30pm on Wednesday 10th of February. The ever-fascinating herbalist, Christina Cromer will be here to show us how to make some simple herbal remedies. Graduating from Westminster University in 2003 Christina now practices herbal medicine in London. Being an Urban Herbalist makes harvesting the herbs a bit tricky, but over the years she's built up a network of different locations from where she can harvest. Bishopstone and the surrounding area is one of her favourite places for gathering elderberries, hips and haws, and mugwort. She then takes them back to her Brixton base where she transforms them into medicines. The process of taking the living plant and transforming it into a medicine in a brown bottle that can then be stored indefinitely is a traditional craft that is still protected under UK law.

Another shooting season is about to end. Hunting will go on until early March. I am not strong on fishing but country sports have played such an important part in my life. Very recently we mourned the loss of my ex neighbour Bob Browning, formerly of Eastbrook Farm, Bishopstone, who managed to pack in a lifetime of hunting, shooting and fishing

as well as running a successful farming business. He had a great friend, Philip Fussell, who has just produced an awfully good book on his exploits, with over 50 biographical images. My motivation for writing these notes is to foster a better understanding between rural and urban life in our villages. Our country sports are good for employment and in protecting our environment and natural habitats. If I were a fox I would prefer to be chased with a good chance of escape rather than shot, or something worse. Oscar Wilde called hunting, the unspeakable in pursuit of the uneatable, so foxhunters have to have a good breakfast! It is good that our local pubs such as the King & Queen, the Rose & Crown and The Royal Oak have offered hospitality at hunting meets, The Woodman used to. In contrast, a shooting man can live well over the winter months



off partridge, pheasant and duck that fall to his gun. Woodcock numerare ous this year but I have now stopped shooting them. Some breed here (though have yet to find a nest) and their large ogling eve. at you can be

disconcerting. A friend owns a section of the river Tweed but I have failed to encourage a number of visible large salmon to take a fly. They were just not interested. More successful has been my experience with crayfish, either the import signal variety (seen here on left) in our local tributaries, or collecting and eating delicious sea crayfish off the coast of

Western Australia. I've even been taken Cormorant fishing on Lake Dali, Yunnan Province in China! Now with grandchildren, I look to the future that they can have the same chance of understanding these rhythms of the countryside. Hunting is ever more popular despite the hunting ban in 2005. Yet it is now threatened, not so much by political views but by busy roads

and loss of country. Some of the shooting fraternity as well, failing to see the bigger picture to give some accommodation to hunting's needs of access, something I have always seen fit to do. My own experience has neither been costly nor conflicting to my interests. The Big Farmland Bird Count takes place 6th - 14th vFebruary. Thirty minutes to count species. You can Google a form:

Bottleman's back. Just for information. Tins and bottles in two plastic bags in the car park cut through off Cues Lane. We're watching you. We think we might move the recycling bins a bit nearer so you can put them in there when you get to the end of the Wyncies footpath. Save you the bother of using your own. Which you've never done. We realise it's a protest about the Oak removing its bottle bank about 8 years ago, when everyone could suddenly re-cycle on their own doorstep. You ought to keep a look out for the yellow lorries on Fridays.

Village play—love it or loathe it, this particular pantomime dame would like to make sure that certain people behind the scenes get a mention; maestro Russell Hatch, for his set, and lights, and occasionally wonky sound effects; Mogs Boon, editrice, for her help with everything, and shutting up at the right times; Carolyn Curtis for managing tickets and sales; Sally Burnett for being a quiet prompt, and an occasionally deaf prompt. We're probably going to suggest that any profits from this year's performances might be used to make a contribution to the Hall's new stage curtains. As I write this, just before the last run, there's the ever present danger that the current set (of curtains) will collapse. They appear to be held together with blu-tack. As performances go, the director, Clive Hill, is obviously thinking that next year a pantomime might be a more suitable route to take, judging by the performance of some members of his troupe. We're anxious for more actors, so if that appeals, let someone know.

Arkell's are now effectively going to invest more than £1m in the *Royal Oak* and *True Heart* development, the saga that never stops. SBC intransigence over site layout, bats and cave paintings has caused a major rethink; the plans are being amended to allow us to develop the *True Heart* site as a probably 12 bed *hotel*, with a courtyard where the hideous flat roof now sits leaking gently. It will

be a glorious thing, and all we have to do is manage it properly to make sure it attracts customers, and pays the large rent, while remaining an important site for the village to use, enjoy and be proud of. To that end, the occasional quiet squeals as we push past drinkers with another plate of pork belly will be a thing of the past, since loads of downstairs space will be freed up for boozers etc, as more eating customers enjoy the view over the garden and Cues Lane, which you'll get into at back garden level. We expect the alterations to The Oak to start in April, and the True Heart to be finished by Christmas; but I think I said that in 2014, as well. There will be some disruption, to customers and village people, but we ask for a little patience, praise the lord. There will be some serious jobs created, as well.




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
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News from Bishopstone Pottery

Despite the shenanigans in the pottery on New Year's Eve we did manage to make some decent pots between us. We sometimes get the urge to add more colour to our pots and take a break from the black and white raku we love. So our New Year pots are made in a basic pale stoneware clay and we are now in the process of using coloured slips to decorate them before they are glazed with a clear glaze.

A coloured slip can be applied to any leather hard pot. It's actually made from clay itself which has a smooth texture from being mixed with water. The slip can be coloured with stains or oxides and it is great fun experimenting with different colours and shades.

We will let you know how they turn out.

Picture top right: The plaque on Bishopstone Pottery's door decorated with coloured slip


