The Vicar's Letter

Dear Friends and Neighbours,

It seems to be a big year for Birthday's. The Ridgeway Link celebrates 20 years of service to our local community and a get together including a little wine and cake took place at Bishopstone Village Hall recently. In the last year alone 18 volunteers provided more than 130 lifts to people, predominantly for medical appointments but trips to get shopping happen too. Funded by a mix of voluntary contribution, a charity fun run and a small but much appreciated contribution from local councils, this is a charity very much focused on service. Formed all those years ago in response to a reduction in the bus service, the proposal was made at a public meeting and has been supported ever since. New volunteers are always welcome and expenses are covered. Similarly, new users of the service are also welcome. Though no fixed charges apply, any contribution is gratefully received. It dawned on him that if he didn't get up to help them, there would be an awful mess. It then dawned on him, if he didn't get up to help others that had also suffered a stroke, then what was the point of him having the stroke in the first place? *My Stroke of Luck* was his biographical account of this

transforming period of his life. It provides a valuable insight into this tragic illness, from the other side of the bed-sheets, as it were. Working with teenagers has shown that many an individual suffering from depression has turned their lives around when they have been given the opportunity to serve. Our Bibles teach us that we are here to have fellowship with God and to serve Him and our neighbour. Celebrating and giving thanks for this and all our blessings are what we try to do each Sunday and you are more than welcome to join us then as well as Sunday 12th June at 10.30am.


Lent Lunches


A Fishy Tail End

Dickie's Diary -

Gardeners and farmers have had few chances to do much in the last month. Writing mid April, it's very wet with most cattle still shut in. One of the wettest springs formed the base year for milk quotas which were brought in 1984 as an EC measure to solve over production and this measure contributed to hardship as the bad weather had affected cow yields that year. Milk

quotas were suspended by the EC last year opening up the prospect of further production in a world market already over supplied and still suffering from Russia's embargo on milk product imports. The tough market place will continue to force more herd sales.

Our spring barley, sown when dry in early March, is all up but heavy land farmers will be despairing and faced with what we call planting cuckoo barley. I did actually briefly hear one here last year! Through our French windows we were watching a song thrush one day eating the contents of a snail, so I said perhaps she has a nest in the garden. Indeed she has, because I found her nest in a lonicera shrub that day and five clear blue eggs with a few black spots on one end. A thrush's nest is always a firm deep bowl often cemented together with a sawdust lining. Helping in the church yard at Ashbury I found another such nest also with eggs amongst a box bush.

The prize for the most intricate nest must go to long tailed tits who construct a domed and spherical nest using up to 3000 tiny feathers bound together with cobwebs. A jenny wren is a close second with its clever nest hidden against a wall amongst twigs or ivy with a tiny aperture on the side. Robins love to nest in outbuildings, often on a ledge with reddish spotted eggs. My father in law near Lechlade has mixed feelings, since he is woken awfully early every morning by screeches from a pair of little owls that have a nest in a leylandii tree just outside his bedroom window. Little owls normally find a hole in a tree so this is rather an unusual site.

News from Bishopstone Pottery

Episode 22

Adrian and I love nothing more than to visit other potteries to gaze in wonder at the superior skills of other potters and to find inspiration for our own work.

This month we were drawn back to another visit to Whichford Pottery in Warwickshire run by potter, Jim Keeling, and famous for their beautiful terracotta garden pots. You may recall that on our last visit I was somewhat enchanted by a scantily clad male potter throwing a very large pot. This time Adrian was having none of that. Instead we were tempted by the Spring sale of seconds. We deliberately took our little car because we promised we would satisfy ourselves with buying one small pot. No such luck. The bargains were too good and we came away with three good sized planters and three small planters. It's amazing what you can get in the boot of a Mazda MX5 if you try!

We would love to make our own large terracotta pots but we are limited by the size of our kiln. We do, however, make most of our own small terracotta pots using a fairly rough clay, which gives the pots a more textured and hardy looking finish. We also fire to a temperature to make the pots frostproof. All clay has an optimum maturation point when firing and the clay is vitrified. This means that all the different ingredients in the clay have melted and bonded together to form a mature, very strong, *ceramic*. If a clay is under-fired (like many of the pottery containers that are called *terracotta*) it is weak

and porous and highly susceptible to cracking, even without being frozen. So the more porous a pot is the more water it will absorb and in cold weather that water will freeze and expand and crack the pot. So by reaching the correct maturation temperature we reduce absorption and create a frostproof pot. Simple. Huh?

Getting back to our day out, after Whichford Pottery, we had a glorious drive across the Cotswolds to Winchcombe Pottery near Cheltenham. We arrived at the old pottery just as a steam train chugged past. It was like being transported to the late 1940's. The pottery was run by Ray Finch for many years until he died in 2012. The yards were full of wood for the wood-firings but only the shop was open as it was Sunday. This was full of beautifully thrown, utilitarian, wood-fired pottery. We could not resist the shape and burnt biscuit colour of a large jug. Would it fit in the boot with the rest of the pots? Of course – just! We made it home with all intact.

Next month will be the last pottery newsletter for a while. We are seriously worried about becoming boring. So I am sure Mogs would be delighted if someone else could offer to write an article for the back page.


And Finally.....
