Some Things You May Not Know

IS THE CORONATION OF KING CHARLES III A PUBLIC HOLIDAY?

The date of the Coronation, 6th May 2023, is not a public holiday as it's a Saturday. A national bank holiday has been declared on Monday, 8th May 2023 to mark the coronation.

Not all communities will honour the extra day off. In Scotland, local authorities can choose whether to declare a bank holiday, and leaders in the Scottish archipelago of Shetland have opted out for 8th May, citing costs among other concerns.

OPERATION GOLDEN ORB

The coronation of the new King and the Queen Consort on 6th May, will set off a series of festive events around the United Kingdom, organised under the code name "Operation Golden Orb."

POMP AND CIRCUMSTANCE

Since 1066, Westminster Abbey has been the setting for the coronation ceremony of nearly every British monarch. On 6th May, the Archbishop of Canterbury will lead the elaborate crowning ceremony under the gothic arches of the central London landmark, broadcast live on the BBC.

During the ritual, Charles will recite the Coronation Oath and be crowned with the historic St. Edward's Crown — comprising a gold frame set with precious gems.

Surprisingly, coronations are not actually a requirement for a monarch. Technically, Charles became King upon the death of his Mother, Queen Elizabeth II.


A MODERN TAKE

view of royalty. In an official statement, it was said that the ceremony will "reflect the Monarch's role today and look towards the future, while being rooted in long standing traditions and pageantry."

In keeping with this more streamlined, contemporary view of the monarchy, King Charles's coronation procession is expected to be significantly shorter and smaller than his mother's, which boasted 16,000 participants along a 4.5 mile route, which took two hours to complete.

THE BIG LUNCH AND HELP OUT

On 7th May, the Coronation Big Lunch will take place, featuring street parties in towns and cities across the nations of the UK. Later that evening, the Coronation Concert and a laser light show will be held at Windsor Castle.

A major theme of the new King's celebrations is volunteerism. To encourage more people to get involved in community service, major non-profit coalitions have organized the Big Help Out campaign, hoping to get people to use the bank holiday of 8th May as a day to contribute to local causes.

In addition, the Royal Voluntary Service is awarding the Coronation Champions Award to draw attention to local citizens helping their communities. Her Majesty The Queen Consort issued a statement applauding the Awards as a way "to shine a light on the herculean efforts of our nation's volunteers. Up and down the country, millions of unsung heroes are contributing to their local communities, giving generously of their time and their talents to enhance the lives of others."

Oh, and in case you haven't heard - Sainsburys have stopped stocking our wonderful bacon and speedy sausages, along with all other organic pork. ECYCLING AATTERS

First of all - confession time!

I (or rather one of my daughters!) resolved my problems with the Boots Scan2Recycle 'app' and I'm ashamed to say, it was all down to 'user error'! It's working perfectly and I'm collecting £5 of Boots Advantage Card every time I recycle 5 tricky items of recycling – like toothpaste tubes and anti-perspirant roll-on bottles. I'm very impressed. The confusion was that it isn't an app at all – it's just a website. When creating the account on my phone, I ended up with a little icon which made it look like an app but was actually just a short-cut to the website. So once my daughter switched on the setting on my phone to enable the internet (as opposed to apps) to access my camera, it all worked beautifully. Here endeth

the saga - hopefully!

Everyone uses the little hack of cutting the end off of a tube (toothpaste, hand cream, cleanser etc) when the contents become difficult to squeeze out and then using the end as a lid, right? That way you can get every last little bit out but the contents don't leak or dry out, it makes cleaning easier (for recycling obviously!) and it's great if you have arthritic fingers like me when squeezing the tubes can become difficult as they empty.

We've finally had our solar panels installed via last year's Solar Together Wiltshire campaign and I'm very impressed so far. Even on a rainy or relatively cloudy day they seem to do well and we're exporting to the grid once our batteries are fully topped up. Sadly we're not being paid for supplying energy to Octopus just yet as where we live is currently unsuitable for a smart meter. That requires a bit more investigation and possibly challenge! Anyway, we're giving back in our own way and at no cost so that's got to be good. We're getting used to switching our habits to dish and clothes wash and charge electricals during the day. I'll report back next month on the impact they've had on our bills in case other people are considering the investment.

I'm a big fan of both money-saving and living a greener life so often buy in bulk to save money and packaging at places like Costco. I'm just trying out a company called Bother.com which is a B-Corp (a company which meets high standards of social and environmental performance, transparency, and accountability.) Their tag line is 'Stock up on the branded groceries you love, for less' and I'm trying them out because I found them particularly good for Eco and refill products that I was struggling to find elsewhere (5 litres of Ecover laundry liquid!) As well as their 'green' credentials, they seem to do well on price comparison

- I checked them out by using the Trolley.co.uk website which compares prices for items across many UK supermarkets and shops. Plus they offer free (over £40 spend) carbon-neutral next day delivery and plant a tree for every order. And if you're into your Cashback* sites you can get 5% back for Bother (and Boots – online and in-store) via Airtime Rewards. I also found a £15 off a £50 spend discount code (use the word 'TROLLEY', valid up to 31/5/23) for new customers so do consider giving them a go. I'll report back next month on how they performed.

Finally one of my favourite TV programmes is the BBC's 'Sort Your Life Out' - I've just rewatched the whole lot on iPlayer! I'm in love with the 4 presenters (who I'm sure get loads of help behind the scenes!) but they always seem so happy and unphased. And a man who likes cleaning the toilet - amazing!! Anyway, loads of little tips on cleaning, upcycling and organizing - it's a great,

inspiring watch. I've just reserved (the show's resident declutterer and organizer) Dilly Carter's book from the library**. One of the things I've picked up from the show is reusing clear plastic and glass jars for storage – it's great – it keeps everything tidy and you can see exactly what've you've got (left). My next project is to make a set of old matching Nutella jars (my kids get through a lot!) to hold our extensive nut selection. My only internal debate being whether I can warrant buying a label maker or whether I should make do with a Sharpie! Fellow fans will understand!

** Aren't libraries amazing? One of the many things that makes me very proud to be British! I love a (totally free!) audio book for long journeys as well as the huge selection of books. I'm currently enjoying a find from there and there's all sorts of reads which change regularly – including the latest copies of magazines. Loving the neighbourliness of it all!

DICKIE'S diary



Last month, I tried to explain the new ELMS (Environmental Land Management) support for farming and the assertion that the new payment schemes could replace the former land based regime, which was basically an EU plan to keep the cost of food low. The elephant in the room on this new approach is that food does not feature. Empty shelves recently enhances the case for home agriculture. My definition of a farmer is one who produces food and there's the rub. To recover the former support in full you would probably have to give up farming. Some will, as I indicated last month. They will be landowners with no debt who can let their workers cottages and turn their buildings over to commercial lets, probably applying for organic conversion to top up the support. They will grow wild bird cover and nectar strips, plant woods and it could look pretty. The wealthy, like the Knebb estate on the Weald and the Mapperton estate in Dorset, have gone further to rewild with a fence round the lot. Those who have good lowland farms with debt or rents to cover like my family farm have no choice but to carry on with a higher output system off most of the best land because the payments are mostly insufficiently

ELMs is complicated with over 200 options, which can absorb management time. We look like claiming on the

intermediate to enhance arable soils at £40/h and risking to forgo insecticides at £45/h. We do not have many small, awkward fields to expand our existing areas on the other options for bird or nectar mixes, so that's £95/h gained against £250/h lost from the previous support. More hedges looks an attractive option at £23/m run and they lock up carbon long term. There is support for enhancing biodiversity over many farms. I would support a scheme on the Lambourn downs between the M4 and Wantage but it would need consents from several very large landowners. As I said last month we are really going to miss that £155/h shortfall (£62,000 on a 1.000 acres)

In the hills and uplands, losing their land based support under the new regime could be even more threatening. Many are already organic and isolated so the opportunity to add further value is limited. Our local organic farm here is adding value to their livestock sales through retail and their pub/restaurant. This is what Jeremy Clarkson is trying to do, if the West Oxon planners would cooperate. On camera he claimed to aim for £10,000 from one beef animal. We get £1,500 in a strong market so it surprises me that the uplift is this strong. Of course there are many extra costs in running an eatery in Bishopstone or even in a lambing shed at Chipping Norton!



Cycle Route No.5 - Bishopstone to Bath

One of my favourite rides ever! A stunning MTB ride through the ancient Savernake Forest before peddling along 39 miles of tranquil tow path whilst meandering along the Kennet and Avon canal to the Roman city of Bath.

Climb out of Bishopstone up Nell Hill, before turning right at the summit and following the Ridgeway to Fox Hill car park. Then take a left past the Burj Indian restaurant, over the M4 bridge and arrive at the T junction on the B1492, where you turn right and then immediately left, heading down hill towards Chiseldon. With great care cross straight over the A346 and then turn left immediately after 3 Trees Café/Farm Shop onto the Swindon to Marlborough Railway Path. The railway path follow the disused train line for 7.5 miles all the way to Marlborough, with the trail crossing the A346 under the flyover at Ogbourne St George. The railway path terminates in Marlborough where it meets the A4 at a T Junction, and at this point take a left and follow the A4 for approx. ¾ mile up a steep section of hill to the summit. You pass the Savernake Hospital on your right before you turn right into the Savernake Forest.

The route takes you through three miles of ancient forest, which houses one of England's oldest trees, The Big Bellied Oak. Cycle straight through the gorgeous habitat, along the Grand Avenue of Savernake, before reaching the Savernake Road. Here take a right and after 1.25 miles and passing through the village of Durley, you arrive at the Kennet and Avon Canal. This route now becomes very easy to explain, simply head westwards along the tow path for 39 miles to the finish. If you set off early enough you will be treated by some fantastic nature spotting, kingfishers, herons and water voles are just some of the treats I've experienced on my last time along this route.

After 17 miles of tow path you will arrive at Devizes and its famous Caen Locks. The Kennet and Avon Canal has awesome examples of canal engineering. The 16 locks that form the steepest part of the flight at Caen Hill are not only a scheduled ancient monument, they are an Olympic sized

challenge every boater must do. This 'wonder of the waterway' is literally a rite of passage. Caen Hill (pronounced 'cane' by the way), is one of the longest continuous flights of locks in the country - a total of 29 locks with a rise of 237 feet over two miles with a 1 in 44 gradient. Fortunately, this route takes on the lock in a downwards direction.

Just after you past through the stunning architecture of Bradford on Avon, you reach another engineering masterpiece, the Avoncliff Aqueduct. Avoncliff Aqueduct carries the Kennet and Avon Canal over the River Avon and the Bath to Westbury railway line. It was built by John Rennie and chief engineer John Thomas, between 1797 and 1801 and is a Grade II* listed structure. This is an ideal refreshment stop as you pass the highly recommended 'No.10 Tea Gardens' or if an Old Inn is more your fancy, then the 'Cross Guns Inn' for a cold beer. Please note to cross the Aqueduct you must first follow the path adjacent to the Cross Guns, passing under before turning back up to

reach the tow path again on the opposite bank of the canal. You simply have eight miles left now as you near Bath, passing Bathampton, with its riverside barge café and village cricket ground, before you drop down the locks of Bath to arrive in the city centre.

I usually then enjoy a lunch in one of Bath's superb options - too many to mention - before returning on the Great Western line back to Swindon (remembering to book your bike on for free) or you may wish to stay the night and reverse the ride the next day!

Egg Decapper

Not a Hollywood Easter nightmare movie but another useful gadget for boiled eggs at Easter. The world is actually obsessed with egg gadgets and paraphernalia. Cutting the top off an egg, topping or decapping could be an art form or an Olympic discipline depending on how important it is for you. I guess most will use a knife, those with experience perhaps a serrated knife, but as we all know it can get messy. Cut too high and the spoon won't fit and then breaks the shell. Too low and you hit the yolk, epic fail. Others bash the dome with the back of a spoon and delicately peel away, nooooo! That doesn't sit well in Claridge's, darlings! Ask the maître d' for an egg decapper! They work and also, very importantly, delegate the responsibility. The simplest form of decapper is an oval or round shaped device lined with super sharp teeth surrounding edge. To operate, place the ring over the top of the egg and squeeze. The teeth pierce the shell simultaneously decapping in one swift move. The sharp the teeth cut effortlessly through the shell leaving no mess. The ultimate device would be the Egg Topper. This gadget, sometimes called

an "egg clacker ", has a steel bell that sits on top of the egg. There is a cutting edge around the circumference exactly where you would wish to top the egg. On top of the bell is a steel shaft with a steel or ceramic round weight on top. The weight is spring loaded and when primed and released the weight "clacks" the shaft, shocking the steel

Humankind: A Hopeful History, by Rutger Bregman

This is a book for anyone who is fed up of hearing how terrible the human race is. Bregman digs into the history of humanity, from our scavenging days, through to the beginnings of 'civilisation', to the subsequent corruption and exploitation of power systems, to the world of war, inequality, injustice and climate disaster in which we find ourselves today. At each step, he challenges the increasingly popular view that humans are by nature selfish, power-hungry and conflict-driven beings. Think Sapiens, but for optimists.

Bregman's writing is well-researched and academically credible, yet completely accessible. And funny. And full of intriguing anecdotes. As someone with an interest in social anthropology and a belief in human goodness, I was compelled and affirmed by the arguments made - a little relieved, in fact, to be fed some scientifically-backed positivity regarding human nature. I couldn't put it down

In his introduction, Bregman claims Humankind to be about one 'radical idea': 'That most people, deep down, are pretty decent.'

Mobile Operators to Test UK Wide Emergency Alerts on 23rd April. What is this?

Don't be alarmed if you hear a loud siren-like sound, lasting for up to 10 seconds from your mobile phone on 23rd April.

The government and mobile phone operators have officially started to activate the new UK-wide emergency alerts service which is designed to warn people of any nearby life-threatening dangers, such as fires, flooding, extreme weather, zombie apocalypse.

By providing a means to get urgent messages quickly to the majority of mobile phones in a defined area, this emergency alerts system is similar to those already in place in other countries. Its purpose is to attempt to transform the UK's warning and information capability by providing clear instructions on how best to respond.

This service will only work on 4G and 5G smart phones.

East Suffolk and Reading have already received live tests but the government also intends to conduct a full UK-wide test on the afternoon of Sunday 23rd April 2023.

Initial use of this system will only focus on the most serious situations and will only ever come from the government or emergency services.

Wanborough St Andrews Church Roof Update

I am pleased to report that the St Andrews Church is once again fully roofed. The final tile has been put in place, and the scaffolding has been removed.

The work was completed during the first week of March, and subject to receipt of final invoices, it was completed within budget. The final site meeting with the church architect and contractor took place in mid-March, when the responsibility of the church, and the keys, were handed back to the churchwarden and PCC.

Roof Project Costings and Fundings

There has been little change to the financial position, and the Total Roof Project Costs are still projected to be in the region of £230,000 (gross). Income from grant applications, donations and fund-raising continues to be received which has reduced the shortfall to just over £45,000.

Sponsor a Tile Campaign

The response to the "Sponsor a Tile" campaign has been quite overwhelming, and Roof Committee members are delighted with the support of over 122 donors raising £6,951.25.

This fund raising initiative will shortly be ending, but it's not too late to have your donation to the Roof Project recorded on the Framed Document to be mounted in church.



Pond Life



Our Village Amphibians

It's thought that around a third of UK ponds have disappeared in the last 50 years. This has obviously had a detrimental effect on the wildlife so it's becoming increasingly important that we look after our ponds. There are many creatures that rely entirely on ponds to stay alive, so with these in decline, so are many amphibians.

This time of year, the natural world is exploding beautifully back to life and ponds are no exception, so this month I wanted to talk a little bit about our slippery friends.

Amphibians spend their larval stages submerged in ponds but once they've developed into adults, they move between water and land, quite often hiding under logs and undergrowth. You have probably seen them shuffling about under the leaves in your own gardens. All amphibians have an aquatic, gill-breathing larval stage which develops into a terrestrial, lung-breathing adult stage so ponds are crucial to their early stages of life.

Toads and newts hibernate out of the water, generally under stones or logs. Frogs are capable of hibernating in or out of water. Most hibernate on land, but some decide to spend the winter at the bottom of deep ponds, comfortably buried in the mud and debris.

Common toads are infrequent pond visitors, except for when they lay

Smooth newts spend most of the early summer in a pond, then emerge to start filling their bellies with yummy invertebrates that they find in tall vegetation. When reproducing, they will carefully wrap each of their eggs, like a little present in leaves submerged in a pond, allowing protection from predators while they develop.

Common frog tadpoles can very cleverly tell if a pond is drying up and will speed up their development process in order to survive. We're so lucky to have such a beautiful pond in our village.

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

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
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A Very BADS Evening


