waste in our households and recycle what we can but do you ever give any thought to how much waste organisations produce? Hospitals must surely produce the most - and I do appreciate why - so much single-use equipment, encased in plastic to keep it sterile, meals in cartons using single-use cutlery etc. And of course for businesses and services, time is money. I volunteer as a teaching assistant at a local school one day a week on my day off and have often wondered why their recycling is so limited - because it's done on a large scale I suspect. Their paper recycling is only for 'white' paper for example. My mission next term is to find out more and see if anything can be done to improve this. Another example is every end of summer term, the school hires

and fills a skip of items that are no longer needed or are broken etc. I suspect 'my' teacher thought I was completely barmy as I rescued box files (hopefully to find a new home on Olio soon!), 'out-of-date' teaching books that still have a monetary value on resale sites and sorted paper from folders etc. to be recycled rather than sent to land-fill. I don't expect teaching staff to spend their time doing this - I know their time can be better spent. But if we could improve this as a community, what a valuable lesson to show the children with the bonus of potential money-saving for the school. Is there anyone out there who would be willing to lend a hand next year? If so, do get in touch via the Ed.

ctribe zero-waste Plastic Free July has come to an end and I'm pleased to say that as a result of the '3 for the Sea' campaign that I reported on last month, I have a new habit that has been as great for my own health and well-being as it has been for our

local environment . To recap, the idea is that each day you 'rescue' 3 discarded bits of rubbish that might otherwise end up in our waterways and ultimately the sea. As a result, I feel more motivated to get outside, even if I can't persuade someone else to come with me, and definitely get more exercise than usual. I've also got more adventurous with my walks, trusty litter-picker in hand, as our usual haunts improve litter-wise. If I know fitting in a walk is going to be a problem due to lack of time or the weather, I now keep a paper carrier bag in the car and pick up items when I've been out and about - or double my quota (or more!) on other days. I'm also recycling more. Rather than doing a litter-picking binge every few months which resulted in a huge bagful that went straight into the bin, I can sort through my little daily load and recycle what normally turns out to be the majority. On a regular route, I target different recyclables on different days to make it even more efficient – sadly getting 3 (or more!) plastic bottles or aluminum cans is rarely a problem. On other days, I take out a bag that's difficult to recycle (that's you - Lily's Pet Food!) and fill that up with non-recyclable litter and pop that straight into a bin when done. I also find it only adds on a manageable amount of time to my walk on a working day – so easier to fit in. And it gives me a great deal of satisfaction! I can't recommend it highly enough if anyone else is considering giving it a go. I'm hooked!

I'm pleased to report I've found another local zero-waste shop, called Tribe, that's well worth a visit in Faringdon. Full details can be found at tribezerowaste.co.uk.


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Happy Gardens

AUGUST MUSINGS

Having just returned from a lovely break, this month's musings are short and sweet. My own garden needs attention, and it occurred to me that yours might be the same? So, I'll jump straight into the potting shed and catch up with you all next month!

THE POTTING SHED THINGS TO DO IN JULY

Traditionally August is one of the hottest months of the year (I'm crossing my fingers for us all!) making watering essential, it's also holiday time so you might need to enlist the help of friends and family to look after your garden whilst you're away, Alternatively, call to arrange some help and enjoy your holiday with peace of mind, and return to a gorgeous, thriving, weeded, pruned and watered garden! It's a new service and I'm offering 20% off this summer to Bishopstone residents. When you are home, here's a list of outdoor tasks.

- · Summer prune Wisteria Cut back the whippy green shoots of the current year's growth to five or six leaves after flowering.
- Prune summer flowering shrubs such as lavender, once they've finished flowering.
- · Summer prune your restricted forms of apples and pears.
- · Keep deadheading your flowering plants just pinch off the faded blooms with finger and thumb.
- Keep watering your containers. Even when it's been raining!
- · Continue to collect seeds from garden plants.
- · Cut out old, fruited canes on raspberries.
- · Lift and pot up rooted strawberry runners.
- · Feed your soil with green manure*.

*Have you tried green manures?

They're fast-growing plants sown to cover bare soil. Often used in the vegetable garden, their foliage smothers weeds and their roots prevent soil erosion. When dug into the ground while still green, they return

valuable nutrients to the soil

and improve soil structure. I'm

going to give them a try this

autumn and I'll put a list of

suitable green manure plants

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on my web site (see below)

In July Peter Biggs from Wanborough Herb Nursery, one of our regular speakers and Silver Medallist at Chelsea, came with ideas for plants that will tolerate our increasingly hot dry summers and the resulting conditions and irregular rainfall. He explained the various coping strategies which plants have developed to survive dry conditions, there are those with long deep taproots, others have adapted their leaf shape to be small, narrow, rolled, or hairy to reduce water loss. Succulents store moisture and aromatic plants have oils which help to retain water.

Peter had brought along a large selection of all types of herbs which tend to grow in poor dry and stony soil that are well adapted to coping with hot arid conditions as well as being beautifully scented and having some very pretty flowers. We came away with a much greater appreciation of how to recognise drought tolerant plants and how to care for them and many of us bought examples to try in our own gardens.

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

Stay safe on Whatsapp

Larger WhatsApp groups are being targeted by scammers, who infiltrate them and deceive members into sending them money. Since January, 268 people have reported falling victim to this scam. Action Fraud reports indicate that victims are often part of large WhatsApp community groups or academic, work, and religious groups.

The fraud begins when a group member receives a WhatsApp audio call from the fraudster, pretending to be a member of the group, to gain the individual's trust. The scammer uses a false profile picture or display name, and at first glance appears to be a genuine member of the group.

The fraudster tells the victim they are sending a one-time passcode enabling them to join an upcoming video call for group members. The scammer asks the victim to share this passcode with them, so they can be registered for the video call. In reality, they are obtaining a code to register the victim's WhatsApp account to a new device and take over the victim's WhatsApp profile.

Once they have access to the victim's WhatsApp account, the fraudster enables two-step verification, blocking the victim from their own account. The scammer then messages group members, or friends and family in the victim's contacts, asking them to transfer money urgently as they are in desperate need of help.

How can you avoid being a victim?

Never share your account's two-factor authentication (2FA) code (that's the six digit code you receive via SMS).

Set up two-step verification to give an extra layer of protection to your account. Tap Settings > Account >Two-step verification > Enable.

THINK. CALL. If a family member or friend makes an unusual request on WhatsApp, always call the person to confirm their identity.

You can report spam messages or block a sender within WhatsApp. Press and hold on the message bubble, select 'Report' and then follow the instructions.

Food Umbrellas!



Well, it may have stopped Well, it may have stopped raining by time this goes to print but Food Umbrellas are the latest craze in covering prepared dishes for garden parties, picnics, barbecues or family gatherings. A great way to keep pesky bugs and wasps away from your food but with a nod to fine presentation. Usually known as cloches in the trade, you may know them as the shiny silver-plated covers under which your white gloved butler presents to you a small

roasted bird such as grouse or partridge at the dining table. Even better presented with a synchronised reveal! Things have perhaps moved on in the real world. The umbrella versions are a great solution: they are relatively inexpensive (sub £5.00), collapse down for storage and the nicest ones are

often adorned with coloured flowers or bees, for example. Another version would be the wire mesh domes or cloches. Usually hand finished in the Philippines or Vietnam, applying bright raffia to make decorative flowers, fruit, insects and animals, these are widely available from garden centres and department stores.

Amphibian, by Christina Neuwirth

picked up this novella the last time I visited Edinburgh, at Lighthouse, a wonderful indie bookshop that calls itself Edinburgh's Radical Bookshop - well worth a visit if you're in the area. Usually I go there to find new books on feminism, neurodivergence, gender identity... All sorts of things I find interesting. On this occasion, I diversified and opted for *Amphibian* from the fiction section, having been intrigued by its synopsis and, if I'm honest, liked the cover (don't judge). When I went up to pay for this and a few other books, the person serving me picked it up and said, "Oh hey, this is my book!" Chuffed that I had chosen her first solo publication, Christina kindly offered to sign and dedicate it to me and we had a wee chat. You've got to love independent bookshops!

As I sit in bed writing this on a particularly dreich day in Edinburgh, having moved to the city only yesterday, Amphibian seems an appropriate book to feature as my first Peach Pip Books recommendation from afar. It centres around Rose, a young woman working in a corporate office in Edinburgh which is gradually flooded. On purpose. By the head office. To 'improve productivity.

On the first day of the flooding, the water is ankle deep and the worst problems caused are soggy shoes and socks. As the days go on, however, and the water gets to kneeheight, then waist and even shoulder-height, her working situation becomes more and more ridiculous. Measures are put in place to protect electrical items, screw desks to the floor and weigh down stationery to prevent the whole

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office from floating. Employees sit at their desks in scuba masks and snorkels. Fish tanks become engulfed by the rising water, so that the office is essentially a fish tank. Rose traipses home through the Meadows day after day, soaked to the skin and baffled. Yet she doesn't quit! It seems to me to be a commentary on the extent to which big businesses can mistreat their employees without much complaint, how far employees will put up with jobs they hate, and how a productivity-fuelled environment is not conducive to productivity.

This book is absurd and hilarious. I laughed out loud on several occasions at various ludicrous mental images, including this one:

You'd walk into your office and find your chair floating there on its back, like a leisurely swimmer, and you'd have to pull it towards you, tilt it slightly and get on it when its feet were pointing downwards.

I don't know why that one tickled me so much.

The Royal Oak Diary



News that the mammoth bones found near Swindon, three years ago, might be being wrapped up and sold to a country in the middle east (for an eight figure sum, to the people who own that patch of land) reminds me of the relatively recent time that those Neanderthal remains were found near Ashbury. The enterprising landowner at that time was also considering selling to the highest bidder, but the Neanderthal relatives still living in the village kicked up such a fuss, even though their knuckles were dragging on the ground, that the (very long) forearms were reconsecrated up towards the Ridgeway. That family no longer runs the Rose and Crown, newcomers will be pleased to learn.

Anyway, for want of no other pressing news stories. I thought I'd have my annual pop at the neighbouring village, in the spirit of summer fun. It reminds me of the time that Kate Keller found the missing Boson Particle under table 4 at HB's Royal Oak, or so we thought. In fact it was a fossilized chip from the reign of the long lamented Brian Walkley, who ran this place as a proper pub - some of you will remember the horse racing on the two TVs, Brian acting as the telephone contact for a local bookies, smoke filled rooms, and a kitchen that served an interesting salad made of mandarin oranges from a tin. We did, despite all that, really enjoy it. Brian, I think of you often. He somehow managed, by spending at least £48, to create five bedrooms; three (three!) where we have our current upstairs (not outside) kitchen, and two where the shop now is. My, they were ghastly. But they were used often by unwary travellers who somehow found themselves marooned in Bishopstone, only too happy to pay £30 a night to climb into a bedframe and onto a mattress that then sunk so low you had to be winched out of it the next morning. We used these beds in our first couple of years here, around 2007, and finally relented and bought something better after one especially old but reasonably agile guest had to be rescued from his 'bed' by his two mates. When the Prince of Wales (now King Charles) turned up with his sixty quests in 2014, he used one of these rooms for his euphemistic 'rest' period and, as some of you will recall, it was re-named the Prince of Wales suite for the rest of its miserable life, and continued to trap unwary travellers from time to time.

As for the current month or so, all I can say is that there's an eclectic mix of entertainment lined up for those with, ahem, specialist interests. Do you fancy learning more about The Archers, the everyday story of country folk, on September 14? Long-time friend and media colleague Graham Harvey was the agricultural story editor and regular weekly script writer over twenty years, until about four years ago. His latest book, Underneath the Archers, is published this month by Unbound (find them online) and he comes to talk about his life with the Archers, and the Grundys, and what it's like working with them, and what the whole thing's about, over supper. £45 per person, great generous food, tell us if you'd like to be there.

We're hoping to have a rugby World Cup supper here, October 2, 3 or 4, on the assumption that England (most rugby people round here support them, I think) and most of the other home nations make it through the group stages. Our guest speaker is likely to be Dave Attwood, holder of 25 England caps and a stalwart of Bath and Gloucester. We will confirm dates and other

details next month. He is a supreme talker (and he was quite good at rugby). The first ever National Agroforestry Show takes place at Eastbrook Farm on September 6 and 7. Tickets for one or two days can be bought online, and it's

for professionals and enthusiasts. Trees can help to save us all, and deliver lots of other goodies at the same time, whether you're farming, or gardening on a decent patch. Advice, talks, tours, demonstrations, they're all part of the programme. Then there's some music and dance on the 6th, from 6pm - Andy Cato, our farming neighbour and musical genius, is performing a Groove Armada DJ set; supported nobly by Big Mudfish and Hooch. We have about 50 tickets left for this, all being sold through the pub at £35 each. A day ticket to the event also gives access to the music that night.

Finally, it's that time of year when you can bring your spare apples, pears, plums, etc. to the pub for us to juice. You know the score - we take them to the juicer, bottle and label them, and we give you some bottles back depending on what you've brought us. Make sure we take a name and phone number when you drop stuff off for us. We take almost any fruit in good condition, from now till mid November. Think about us when you see that fruit starting to drop from your trees.

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




They have produced the most amazing rich compost that looks and smells like coffee! Not your usual compost smell.

There is no Repair Café in August as the date clashes with the Shrivenham Fete, so the next one will be Saturday 23 September. You might not be aware that we have adjusted our opening hours for Saturdays to (hopefully) catch more people as they go the get their papers, milk etc. Wednesdays stay the same at 1000-1600, but on Saturdays we will now be open from 0900-1400.

Currently we have a pop-up school uniform event - lots of primary age clothes - and we are also still accepting donations to this event. Why waste your money on new when you can get perfectly good pre-worn. The rate children grow, it makes sense and all we ask for is a donation to SS. Talking of donations, we have just accepted our 1,000th item to the Thrifty-50 store, where there is a very wide selection of new/pristine condition items from clothes to small electrical items (all checked and PAT tested) to children's toys to all sorts of household items.

In June we saved 126.45kg from being sent to landfill and in July the figure jumped to 348.41. We have added two more refill containers to the washing detergent and washing-up liquid - we now have handwash and allpurpose cleaner.

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
