A Snippet of Bishopstone History

Best Kept Village 1975

I was one of about twenty-five people, consisting of mums, dads, children, (and dogs), who assembled at the Village Hall earlier this year for a village clean up day. We all set off in different directions with our plastic bags and pick up sticks. I teamed up with Liz (Warwick) and Millie, and off we went.

It occurred to me afterwards, that not one of those volunteers, would have been aware of Bishopstone's accolade when, in the 1970's, we won 'Wiltshire's prettiest well-kept village'! It was a tremendous achievement at the time, as Castle Coombe had won it year on year.

It came about when a group of us were spring-cleaning the church, namely, Pat Selbourne, Nancy Harding, Mary Lee and me, and the conversation moved to whether we would stand a chance of beating Castle Coombe. They were a hard act to follow, but we determined there and then to give it our best shot and involve all the village - yes, all the village - and give it 110%.

We were a very small community back then, so it wasn't difficult to spread the idea via the two shops, school, WI, both pubs and the church. In those days there were very few of us under the age of 35. It was a predominantly older community with a wealth of experience, dignity and strength, which we struggled to match. We had deep admiration for their expertise and ability to 'get on with it', however difficult. It was a time when age and experience demanded huge respect.

And so, we started. It wasn't just a case of picking up litter - that was the easy bit. We had to dig and pull out metal headboards, springs, mattresses, car exhausts, tyres, fridges, freezers and washing machines etc. It was difficult to get rid of large items then, legally. There was no Barnfield Road or local authority to help and it was long before skips. These things had been sticking out of the ground for years! Headboards and springs were incorporated into boundary fences, with nature eventually covering them.

The day the committee arrived to inspect, Mary Lee and I went



up to Manor Farm to sit and worry with Nancy and Frank, and late afternoon we had a call to say we had won! The following day, the Press from all over Wiltshire descended on us, wanting to interview people and take photographs, but we were just happy to have won. It was a herculean effort by all the villagers.

The plaque commemorating the occasion was fitted on the front of the mill by Fred Razey, the builder in the village, long before it became a dwelling. The original plaque is now displayed outside the village hall for all to see. Hinton Parva's plaque is also on their village hall.

To this day there are still relics of beds to be seen in the village, which were just too embedded to be moved, so we left them. I have one in my boundary fence bordering the allotments, which has been there so long that a fully mature tree has grown right through it, with both ends sticking out.

So, ladies and gentlemen, as my personal salute to the year Bishy kicked Castle Coombe into touch, we will clean the rust off and paint it - no, not red, white and blue, and who knows, I might just put some bunting around it, and lights at Christmas. A little bit of Bishopstone history. The party we had in The Oak afterwards is the stuff of legends, in the days when we used to drink. Pub closing time didn't apply that night, we all staggered home in the early hours.



I updated my Freezer List so I could find out what really was in Ridgeway and then picked up a further 17 recyclable items on there and to put away more blackberries and fruit compote - and the way back down - all arrived in the 2 weeks since I walked guess what I found? A tub of blackberries, a tub of apple, some that particular route last. of our Christmas picky bits that didn't get used up and a whole Next time - hopefully! A look at other small tweaks that you can lot of bread that meant I didn't have to buy any for two weeks! take to make a difference - this time, environmentally friendly loo I've learned my own lesson - and am using food up to make roll! We've been sampling 'Who gives a crap's recycled paper space for a bit more and thinking ahead for Christmas! Talking of our native Autumn fruits, aren't they great for saving money, and bamboo offerings plus hope to include 'Cheeky Panda's bamboo toilet roll to give our verdict. Watch this space! plastic and air miles - particularly if you have access to your own Karen Walker or from a neighbour? I love fruit on my breakfast cereal and I open freeze and then store blackberries so they pour straight out and freeze apple and pear compote in single portions - silicone Yorkshire pudding trays are brilliant for this and once frozen, they can be stored in a reusable freezer bag. Lakeland has a great range that includes silicone trays and strong, resealable and reusable freezer bags. I remember my grandparents and Dad used to bottle pears in Kilner jars – and they used to taste wonderful. I've just been 'googling' (other search engines are available!) so that might be my next experiment with any pears we have over.

Also, as I wrote last month, more online searching came up trumps! I managed to resolve a problem I'd been having with my washing machine - I'd be hanging out freshly washed sheets and would spot mysterious blobs of black on them. Happy Gardens



Hello! The days are growing shorter, and I find myself scanning the garden for cheerful colour to brighten up our shortening hours of light. It occurred to me that this is the time of year where colour is needed more than ever, and yet many of our favourite flowers are fading. My musings led me to research, and I have selected a lovely collection of 'carry-ons' (see plant spotlight) that you might like to include in your borders next year.

BOX CATERPILLAR DAMAGE

I had intended to chat about compost but whilst recently wearing my border maintenance hat, I've had the sad task of diagnosing box caterpillar damage in our area. Unfortunately, both box blight (a fungal disease) and box caterpillar damage are spreading across UK. If you have box plants, please check them for brown patches. Both ailments effect trimmed or topiary plants more than box that's left to grow naturally. Blight will change the leaf colour to brown and fallen leaves are found at the base of the plant. Treat your specimens with a spray such as Topbuxus Health Mix. Box caterpillars tend to eat the leaves and leave brown patches of twigs. Their webs are difficult to see with the naked eye but take a closeup photo of the damaged area with your phone and enlarge the image, hopefully you won't see any tell-tale fine webs but if you do, all is not lost. A range of treatments are available such as environmentally friendly Topbuxus XenTavi found on Amazon or use nematodes. Please let me know how you get and if you have experience of using other control methods, I'd love to know and share your findings with our community.

THE POTTING SHED **THINGS TO DO IN SEPTEMBER**

- · Clear up fallen leaves and make leaf mould piles to use as next year's mulch.
- · Protect ponds from leaf fall with netting.
- · Plant tulip bulbs for next spring
- · Prune roses (if you haven't already) to prevent wind-rock.
- · Insulate outdoor containers that aren't frost proof with bubble wrap and raise them off the ground with 'pot feet' or bricks.
- · Place grease bands around fruit trees to prevent winter moth damage
- Mulch, mulch, mulch!

DICKIE'S diary

The first harvest I can recall was 1958. Writers like to fantasise, remembering the benign summers of times past. Well, this one was stormy and difficult. As small farmers (250 acres) with 40 Shorthorn milking cows and followers, my father also grew 80 acres of corn plus about 10 acres of potatoes and 10 acres of sugar beet. For us, this was the last year with the binder before he bought a small combine and I remember the sheaves in stooks, placed to dry but incessant rain prevented carting and the wheat was growing out, so the tops of the sheaves were green. JM Stratton's agricultural records give wheat yields that year of 1.25 t/acre (3t/hectare) sold at £20/t. Now we expect 4t/a (10t/h) and prices have come down from last year's highs over £300/t to around £200. The Ukrainian war and oil supplies remain volatile drivers for prices in agriculture and food generally.

This year's harvest was stop go to get it in the barn and and she has endorsed the continued use of roundup, essential generally across the country we have finished up with disappointing yields. Like the curate's egg it has been a for non-organic regenerative farming. It's never an ill wind. The wet summer has been good for the harvest of two halves. 

Inside the Peach Pip

The Most Human Human: What Artificial Intelligence Teaches Us About Being Alive, by Brian Christian

Hello, all. Just a quickish recommendation today, as I have been busy living it up in the city (not The City) and have left this to the last minute.

I have just finished reading The Most Human Human, a non-fiction book looking into the Turing test and what exactly distinguishes human from machine. Brian Christian writes about his preparations for participating in the 2009 Loebner Prize competition, a recently discontinued yearly contest aiming to establish how far Al programs are able to imitate human conversation in typed interactions. The contest involved four human participants, four AI programs and a panel of judges, each of whom conversed with both human and computer and cast their vote for whichever they believed to be the human. Once votes were cast, a prize for 'The Most Human Computer' would be awarded to the program that fooled the most judges, whilst the human who best conveyed their humanity would be bestowed the prize, 'The Most Human Human.' Christian would be vying for the latter.

This was a slow read at times, as Christian discusses at length the mathematical theory behind developing a program that plays to its strengths, maximising the



Residents have complained about the sporadic postal deliveries in the parish of late.

WORK NEEDED AT THE DINGLE

The parish council is seeking quotes for work to replace the retaining boards which are failing badly at several places alongside the path through The Dingle.

30MPH LIMIT REQUESTED

Ward councillor Gary Sumner has been asked to follow up on the parish council's request for a 30mph limit on Bodyhorse Hill as a matter of priority.
