THE REFILLERY


This month, I'm concentrating on the amazing community asset, Sustainable Shrivenham. stated aim is to 'equip the local community with the information, skills and resources to inspire and enable them to make more sustainable choices in their

everyday lives'. I attended their recent AGM and asked who they consider to be their 'local community' and am pleased to say that we very much feature! This may be of particular interest if you need financial assistance for your own community sustainability project as any profits from the initiative has to go back into the community and currently it is running at a small profit of around £2,000.

There are changes afoot for The Hub. They will close from the 20th December until around March of next year as the existing building is renovated and changed to accommodate a bigger and improved Shrivenham Post Office. The Hub will retain 50% of the building and are hoping that with the addition of The Refillery shop, they can continue to offer all their current services in their refurbished premises.

I recently spent some time having some training in The Refillery shop so I can volunteer there and took the opportunity to have a good look around at some of the perhaps more unexpected things that they sell - they have such beautiful but practical items. It's well worth a look. If you still use a tumble dryer, they have the cutest sheep wool balls which help shorten drying time and thus save energy and money. They are selling books by the inspirational, no-nonsense, green goddess and former British Bake Off winner, Nancy Birtwhistle. Definitely ones for my reading list! They have brightly coloured string bags and mini dustpan and brushes for household surfaces. There are biodegradable sponges and scourers and essential oils. On the food side there's fill-your-own wholewheat pasta, three varieties of rice and couscous - great if you want to give them a try or only need a small amount for a recipe. There's also a Fruit Cake mix of a variety of dried and glace fruits so you don't have to make multiple purchases that you might then never use again. We're slowly working through the household

products and I can recommend the spray toilet cleaner!



Finally, misquoting the words of the entrepreneur Victor Kiam. 'I liked it so much, I bought into the Community Benefit Society' and became a member. I did feel that I had 'found my tribe' at their AGM and they seem to be led by an impressive and dedicated team. If you're equally inspired, you can become a member for an annual nominal membership fee of a minimum of £5. Details are on their website. Maybe I'll see you at their next AGM!











HAPPY GARDENS by Jane Pearson





Monthly Musings

It's been a busy Autumn, my working days filled with bulb planting and perennial dividing, hedge trimming and topiary shaping. There is something very satisfying about preparing a garden for the winter and it's a joy to see crisp geometric evergreen shapes that seem to pop in the low light of the year. I actually look forward to the first frosts that expose the beautiful skeleton of a cared for garden!

For the love of gardening



It's the perfect time to plant bareroot plants. But please don't let their forlorn looks put you off! They're more robust than you may think and planting in the dormant season gives the plants roots a good chance to establish and thrive.

In my day-to-day work, we're busy planting hedging. The young bare root hedging plants are known as whips and all bare root plants need soaking in buckets of water for at least a couple of hours. Give them time to rehydrate before being planted and they will reward you. Hedging isn't the only bare root option. Roses are a great buy this time of year as well as fruit trees, Strawberries and peonies.

The potting shed

It's beginning to feel distinctly wintery, with wet windy weather being much more common and the frosts are starting to bite, but it's not too late to plant some spring bulbs where gaps appear. Other tasks for November & December include:

- Prepare your garden for winter; insulate outdoor taps by wrapping them in bubble wrap held in place with an elastic band. Wind-up hose pipes and store them in the shed or garage and (if you're lucky enough to have them!) remove irrigation system timers and batteries.
- Plants for free! November is a good time to take cuttings from evergreens such as privet, ceanothus, pittosporum, escallonia and hebe.
- Tidy up! Continue to weed. Rake fallen leaves from lawns and borders and store in black bags or chicken wire pens to make leafmould, it's a great free mulch for the following winter! Remove hellebore leaves. Old leaves can carry leaf spot disease and may affect new growth, so snip the old leaves off, right at the base of the stem and show off the flowers when they arrive.
- Sow sweet pea seeds now in old loo roll middles and let them over winter in a cool spot with plenty of light such

as a cold frame or unheated greenhouse. Tip; mice love germinating sweet pea seeds, so prior to sewing, try soaking the seeds in liquid seaweed fertilizer or garlic water, it's said to disguise the smell and deter the mice, I'm going to try it myself this winter!

If you're there, Fanny, do say hello. You may find we're actually rather lovely. And if not, well—there's always more wall space in the downstairs loo for your next masterpiece.



She had arranged for its transfer to the UK after rabies protection and to me after only a fortnight here, things were going swimmingly well for both parties. I gave her a hiding and she never did it again. Fun had a good temperament but something went wrong with the training. We needed an electric collar and a buried wire round the curtilage of Rectory Farm to keep her in. Somehow, she would know if there was a power cut or the electricity was off. Friends christened her Porsh because of her speed out shooting. Tragically she had to be put down after getting under my landrover wheels. Crumpet and Flo have been great successes and good retrievers. There is something truly magical seeing your dog bring back a pheasant or a duck across water for the first time. Training Crumpet she was not that keen on dummies. Reluctant to lose this dummy which I had thrown in a gravel pit, it was drifting away and I found myself having to swim for it myself, complete with rubber boots. Fortunately, it was summer! Penny loved Crumpet who was blue roan. Flo is black and now a prima donna aged thirteen.

Inside the Peach Pip

No One Is Talking About This, by Patricia Lockwood

'Why had she entered the portal in the first place? Because she wanted to be a creature of pure call and response: she wanted to delight and to be delighted.'

Having our phones in our pockets, and our lives contained within them, has become part and parcel of doomscrolling has become a daily activity and being human in the modern world. In No One is Talking About This. Lockwood tells a story in two halves. narrated by an unnamed protagonist who has gained a following for her social media posts, and is living a life entirely absorbed in what she refers to as 'the portal'. The first half of the story is told as an almost stream of consciousness and doesn't have much of a traditional plot at all. One gets the sense she is flicking through posts in the portal and her thoughts are darting all over the place in response, one distraction to another. The portal dictates her life - whatever she sees in the portal Flinging love, Anna in the morning will be the thing that occupies her brain all day, whether that be something depressing or amusing or simply absurd. She is truly obsessed with the portal.

The second half of the novel is where reality forces its way back in. When faced with the tragic news that her

sister's baby will be born with a rare genetic disorder. Proteus syndrome, the protagonist begins to refocus. She becomes more attentive to and emotionally involved in the world around her, as the baby is born and she observes its weightless joy juxtaposing its tragic, heavy condition. Such love and heartbreak, she finds, is impossible to express in the unserious language of the portal. Although she is still in some ways a person in and of the portal, by the end of the novel I feel she has lost her craving for it and come to know that outside the portal lies truth, depth and freedom, should she be bold enough to face them.

This feels like an important novel in 2025, when social media is increasingly being used to propagate groupthink and spur hatred. It is a reminder that the moreish portal, although temporarily satisfying, does not fulfil. Life is in us and around

us, it is painful and beautiful, and we need to live it fully to love it.


A good way to rescue yourself from the portal? Read a book! This one's auite good.

A Letter From The Vicar

November is the month of remembrance. Remembering both those who lost their lives in the wars and conflicts of the past, and also of those who we loved so deeply, but see no longer, those who have now passed onto a distant shore, the remembrance of All Saints Day at the start of the month.

But what does the task of remembering actually ask of us and why is it so important? Why do we need so much reminding anyway? There are times in this life when to be able to forget might seem to be more merciful. Many of the most brutal conflicts around the world are caused precisely because people can't, or won't forget, or forgive, and are trapped in cycles of hatred, revenge and bitterness.

Those suffering trauma may also long to forget but, of course, it is impossible to unlive experiences so deeply profound and so utterly painful. After my own father's death in 2017 I gradually came to realise, as my understanding of what trauma is developed, that what made sense of many aspects of his life was that he was a war time kid, who grew up amidst the carnage of the blitz in Shepherds Bush, London, He used to tell us what happened but never, never, how it felt!

It seems that to remember well is part of the journey to an acknowledged acceptance of past reality that allows healing and a letting go into new life. To heal we also need to be present to the pain, to look it in the face and know that it is not the last word on our lives, or on life itself. For Christians this is a journey with and in Christ, "who went not up to joy but first he suffered pain, and entered not into glory before he was crucified." The cross of Good Friday, the deep loss, hopelessness and grief of Easter Saturday for the disciples, before the bright dawn and new life of Easter Day, is at the heart of God's redemptive work for our troubled lives. In our fallen world this seems to be the universal pattern of remembering that leads to new life in the here and now, as well as the promise of new life to come in eternity, in the ultimate making of all things new.

Indeed, when Jesus departed physically from our presence, he didn't leave us a set of precise words to memorise so that we could enter into his healing work on our behalf, but an action to do. Luke 22: 19 "Then he took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to them, saying, 'This is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me." Remembering is important. It brings an honesty before God about ourselves and about the past; it is an honouring of lived experience, of lives given for the good of others, of loved ones we have cherished and the grief of their absence from us, as well as a bringing into that space constantly, God's great love for us, poured out on the cross in Jesus, as he took into himself the sin, evil and death which so disfigures and hurts.

It is in the remembrance of this act of the self-giving love of God that our new life and hope for healing and wholeness, for ourselves and our world, springs forth.

We could also add that written into the landscape and the surrounding settlements, farms and chalk downlands, lies a further record of the human story in these parts of God's good creation, here in North

Over the weekend of 4th and 5th of October, as the newly constituted single Anglican Parish of the Wellspring Villages, we picked up many of these threads and wove them together into a beautiful picture of the human journey so far in our villages, while anticipating new united pathways going forward into a new future together.

The former Anglican Parishes of Lyddington, Wanborough, Bishopstone and Hinton Parva became the single Anglican Parish of the Wellspring Villages on 1st June and we marked and celebrated this in a Pilgrim Walk around the four churches on the Saturday, and a special Harvest Celebration Service on the Sunday at All Saints, followed by a 'bring and share' Harvest Lunch in Wanborough Village Hall.

About 20 people met at St. Andrew's, amidst beautiful flower displays, harvest produce and pealing bells, with others joining along the way. We gathered around the font and used water collected from one of the Wanborough springs to symbolise our faith, hope and love in God, which we pledged to pour out in His service in the days and years ahead, as we poured the water into the font. Then Dame Sarah Troughton, a member of our worshipping community and Lord Lieutenant of Wiltshire, sent us all off, with suitable words of encouragement, on our Wellspring Pilgrim Walk around our four churches of Wanborough, Liddington, Bishopstone and Hinton Parva. It was a beautiful Autumnal day, cloudy with sunny spells and a strong gusting breeze.

In Liddington the bell ringers gave a demonstration of Bell Ringing

using a camera and video link so that we could watch the bells in action at the same time as the bell ringers handled their bell ropes, in a complex synchronicity of shifting patterns. Using Liddington Spring water this time, we again gave thanks around the font for the settlement of Liddington, formed around clear spring waters emanating from the chalk downlands above many generations ago, and for the church community of All Saints, established in subsequent centuries. Again, we pledged ourselves to the ongoing service of God in this place as we poured the water into the font.

The longest stretch of our walk took us down through the Liddington Combe, under the M4, up to the Ridgeway Path heading towards Foxhill and then up onto the high Ridgeway path along the top of the chalk escarpment, overlooking the Vale of the White Horse. A stunningly beautiful stretch before turning left down the Bishopstone Coombe to Bishopstone Village Hall for Lunch. Delicious autumnal soup and fresh oven baked bread replenished our depleted resources. From here we returned to St. Andrew's via St. Mary's Bishopstone and St. Swithun's Hinton Parva, following the same pattern of prayer and reflection. This took us winding through the lower fields and farmland beneath the chalk escarpments, past human settlement and finally up onto the large open field and children's play area east of St. Andrews. We plan to make this walk an annual event. It is a stunning beautiful and varied walk, through amazing countryside, which also offers the opportunities to pause for thanksgiving, reflection, praise and prayer, in the wonderful ancient churches of these four villages. Each village formed around fresh water springs flowing from the Downs. Our prayer is that the living water Jesus promised the women at the well in John 4, will indeed well up in us, his followers and people, in this newly constituted single Parish of the Wellspring Villages in the years ahead.

THE HARVEST CELEBRATION SERVICE:

Sun 5th October 10.30am All Saints Liddington.

Pealing bells again welcomed us to church at All Saints, Liddington, on the Sunday morning, along with glorious Harvest displays of flowers and produce of all kinds and a stunning cake, in the shape of an open Bible with the words of John chapter 4, verses 13 and 14 printed onto the fondant icing on the top "Jesus said to her, 'Everyone who drinks of this water will be thirsty again, but those who drink of the water that I will give them will never be thirsty. The water that I will give will become in them a spring of water gushing up to eternal life." So, we were actually able to read and inwardly digest Jesus' words in every possible sense. Naturally, the theme of the service focussed around water, it's amazing and unique properties, without which there would be no life on earth and no harvest at all. Julian Cook, a local farmer, shared his experience of the importance of water in his life, as well as his experience of the living water, God's Holy Spirit, that Jesus promised to give us when we put our faith and trust in him. The centre piece of the service was a symbolic action, involving our four Churchwardens each carrying spring water from one of the four villages, coming together at the font and pouring those waters simultaneously into a bowl on the font, as we dedicated ourselves afresh to the ongoing work of prayer and the service of God, in this special place of the Wellspring Villages.

Not everything went to plan. The pages of the order of service got accidentally printed in the wrong order. I didn't notice in the busyness before the service began. This made for an interesting service with an entirely new order of proceedings which seemed to have a life all of their own. I couldn't help recollecting, afterwards, the words of Britain's best loved comedian, who wisely stated after he tried to play the introduction to Grieg's piano concerto unsuccessfully, "These are all the right notes (for us words), just not necessarily in the right order." Happily, it didn't detract from the service at all, if anything, it made it even more special and unique

THE CELEBRATION HARVEST LUNCH: Sun 5th October 12.30pm Wanborough

The 'bring and share' Harvest lunch took place in Wanborough Village Hall. The food was superb, as was the wine, and far more then we could consume in a single lunchtime, although it was well worth the effort. There was of course cake, the grand cake in the form of an open Bible. What truly English occasion could take place without cake! This inevitably led to a cake cutting ceremony, a toast to the newly formed Parish of the Wellspring Villages with an excellent splash of bubbly and a heartfelt round of applause to bring our weekend celebrations to a suitable end.

Thank you to everyone who attended some, or all of the proceedings, and a very special thank you to everyone who worked hard to help deliver what turned out to be a thoroughly enjoyable and significant weekend in the life of our new Anglican Parish of the Wellspring Villages. If the teamwork on display this weekend is a taste of things to come, then the future of our single Parish promises to be both truly positive, interesting, creative and united.

We doubt the miscreant is anyone local (we know residents are too proud of our pond to pollute it!) but we are now asking walkers and people living nearby to keep an eye out for anyone dumping quantities of bread or other waste material in the pond and intervene gently to educate and advise.

Harm to wildlife Bread has little nutritional value for ducks, swans, fish, or other pond life. Eating too much of it can please, always in small quantities.

Attracts pests Decaying bread can attract rats and other vermin.

Unnatural crowding

GRITTY BUSINESS

If you have a road salt/grit box near your home, please check whether it is stocked ready for the winter. If you notice that one needs refilling or repair, please report to Swindon Borough Council at https:// www.swindon.gov.uk/info/20040/ road safety maintenance and repa irs/342/report an empty or dama ged salt box or salt bin You only need a thin layer of salt to treat an icy area. If you are putting salt onto snow, it will not thaw instantly. You should clear the area, add a dusting of salt and walk over it to work it into any remaining snow. Take care to not block drains or push snow into piles in areas where people may walk or drive. You should not use salt from grit bins on private footpaths, driveways or properties.

Pumpkin leftovers

It's a scary fact that every tonne of waste that isn't recycled costs around £140 of taxpayers' money on general waste disposal costs. The question is what to do with the pumpkin once Halloween is over: if you've got more pumpkin than you can use straightaway, you can freeze it - just parboil in chunks, cool and pop it in an airtight container, ready to conjure up something delicious another day. Otherwise, please recycle in your compost or food waste caddy.





The Royal Woke Diary



Having a flick back through the payroll archives the other day, I see that in the 19 years we've been running the worst pub in the village that we've now passed the 230 current and previous employees figure. Not bad for a tin pot little business that began as a hobby, to save a pub (and then two) from itself. And which now has a wage bill of about £35k a month. The reason I start with this is that I am increasingly exasperated by the focus of our supposed national and international leaders on so called 'productivity', with the aim being I suppose to get more 'work' done by fewer people.

Before I continue this rant, I would also point out that probably 140 of those people we've paid over the years are the offspring of our neighbours, in this parish, in Ashbury, Wanborough, Shrivenham, Bourton and Liddington, to name a few. Some of them lasted a week; some a month; some 16 years, remarkably. Lots of them still come back and work here when their education pattern allows. And then of course, they go off and get 'proper' jobs, as one of my Bishopstone exneighbours once irritatingly told me, referring to his daughter, who'd learned some vital life skills in her three years with us.

My own view is that people, real people, are crucial to the success or otherwise of a business. There's so much hype about AI (NOT artificial insemination on this occasion), and Bots, and digital forms of communication—but do you always enjoy dealing with businesses on this basis? 'Your assistant Jane is ready to help you...' says the little pop up in the corner of the screen—what, at 11pm on a Friday night? I hope you're paying her properly.... Do you enjoy a Bot chat with a company that's sent you something that doesn't work: or you need to have something fixed, and the Bot has no idea what you're talking about. 'Are you satisfied with that answer?' No I'm bloody well not! I want somebody to talk to! (I have to ask, is this an age thing?)

On top of that, looking at the current state of play, we have a need for more jobs, locally, nationally and further afield, not fewer. So increasing productivity, to make stuff cheaper, or profit margins fatter, doesn't create the jobs that earn the income that allows people to pay for this stuff in the first place, regardless of the price. It creates a population of unemployed folk that then costs the rest of us loads of money

We are inundated with offers from digital companies offering gizmos that mean we could reduce our staff numbers. We could give you all tablets (electronic ones to start with, then possibly something to help you sleep at night) and let you order via a QR code. Our kitchen automatons could then lower the basket into the deep fat fryer unaided. The beer could be self dispense equipment, of course, like you increasingly

find at major events. You (and we) could avoid human contact completely, if we really wanted to. No thanks. Businesses like this, and lots of other trades, really rely on that interaction between people talking and listening to each other. Apart from anything else, it ought to be part of the fun, as well as enhancing the enjoyment of society. So we'll continue to avoid the QR codes etc, and carry on employing people and making their future lives so much more rewarding. And probably get penalised by Government for doing so!

Oh, by the way, we're open 7 days a week-FOBS are having a fundraising supper here on the 17th of November, still aiming for their £20k target for the refurb of the Bishopstone school playground. Our Ukraine Peace talks dinner is November 20, sadly Mr Putin can't come, and it's sold out anyway, so he's too late if he changes his mind. December menus reflect Christmas flavours and ingredients; I'm thrilled to see Bishopstone Village Hall is hosting a lovely party on New Year's Eve, takes the pressure off us to make an effort, so I hope loads of you go and enjoy it. Pop in here for a drink beforehand if you need reminding why that night is overblown hype imho.




